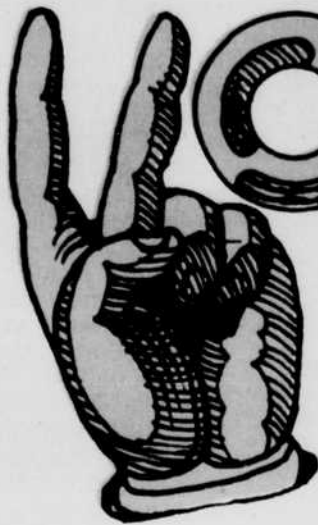

The primary responsibility of student government is to students on campus. Student government must not accept tasks beyond its scope. In all cases, its duties must be administered with openness to criticism and fiscal responsibility. An atmosphere of complete openness requires that all ASUO documents are available for public access.

A budgeting system must be devised to ensure reasonable fees are allocated fairly and with foresight. Fair and adequate funding must be obtained for groups affecting large numbers for student participants such as the EMU, the Athletic Department and the Marching Band.

The ASUO Executive and the UO must use their collective lobbying power to ensure adequate financial aid.

Student insurance problems must be rectified. A local agent and a registration check-off system must be provided.

Childcare funding must be diversified. This vital program must be

supported through private and governmental grants—students alone cannot afford these escalating costs.

A ratio of four campus users for one parking space can no longer be tolerated. We will work to see that new areas are developed and students have access to them.
