

Unidentified man assaulted outside campus Glenwood

A transient was assaulted late Tuesday night in front of The Campus Glenwood Restaurant, 1340 Alder St.

According to witnesses, a group of six transients were sitting on the porch outside the restaurant when two of them got into a scuffle. In the ensuing struggle, the victim was knocked to the ground and his head was slammed four or five times into the sidewalk in front of the restaurant.

The unconscious victim, bleeding from the head, was transported by ambulance to Sacred Heart General Hospital.

He was described by witnesses as a white male, 35-40 years old.

The assailant was described by witnesses as a white male, 35-40 years old, with hair past his shoulders. He was wearing a shaggy coat and jeans and was last seen heading west on 13th Avenue.

According to a preliminary police report, the incident was first reported as a fall but was later reported as an assault on the apparently intoxicated victim by six suspects.

Student wins advertising awards

The competition, sponsored by the College Newspaper Business Advertising Managers, Inc., drew hundreds of entries from college newspapers all over the country.

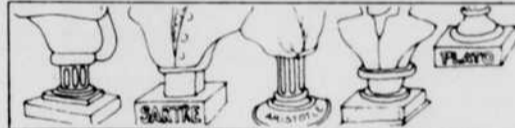
