Oregon shuts down Lewis and Clark, 9-0

After enduring the role of underdog for so long, the Oregon men's tennis team finally enjoyed a couple of afternoons in the sun this week.

Heavily favored against Linfield College and Lewis and Clark College, the Ducks didn't disappoint, capping its two-day home stand on Wednesday by thrashing an undermanned Lewis and Clark squad, 9-0. Oregon's record now stands at 6-7.

Oregon turned back Linfield, 8-1, on Tuesday.

The victories came on the heels of a strong showing in the Intercollegiate Championships last weekend, when the Ducks edged the University of Portland for second place.

The Ducks hope that the momentum they've built in the last week will aid them this weekend as they compete in the Pacific Northwest Intercollegiate Team Championships in Seattle.

Oregon coach Buzz Summers was pleased with the victories, but was happier about the fact that the Ducks continued to improve and play good tennis, even against weaker competition. "I've been pleased with our play all season," Summers said. "But this last week we've played really well."

The Ducks were never seriously threatened in either of this week's matches. The only player to lose a match was freshman James Hazard, who found himself playing number-one singles for the first time after Summers decided to give the usual ace, Pat Jennings, a rest. Hazard lost to Linfield's Steve Gorman 7-6, 2-6, 7-6.

"James could have easily won that match," Summers said. "He's still lacking the killer instinct you need to win the close matches. But he's only a freshman playing a senior."

Hazard came back to team with Jennings at number-one doubles to get back at Gorman and Des Bourgneseug 3-6, 6-3, 6-2. Another Duck who had a big day against Linfield was freshman Dave Roberts, who won at number-six singles 6-0, 6-0, then combined with Brent Laing at number-three doubles to win easily 6-0, 6-1.

Jennings came back at number-one singles Wednesday to win big 6-1, 6-1. Roberts and Jennings then teamed at the top doubles slot and won going away 6-0, 6-2. It was pretty much the same story throughout the match.

Jamie Horne, playing number-two singles, won 6-1, 6-0, then proceeded to help partner Brian Copeland to a 6-0, 6-1 victory at number-three doubles. Copeland also won at number-five singles 6-2, 6-1, and fourth-seeded Peter Bartlett won 6-0, 6-0.

Ducks end tour, finish in 11th place at Santa Cruz

What goes up doesn't necessarily come down.

Take the Oregon men's golf scores at the Western Intercollegiate in Santa Cruz, Calif., for example.

The Ducks ended their bogie tour of California with an 11th-place finish in the 25-team field.

Consistency was not a problem for the 19th-ranked Ducks at Saanta Cruz. They played poorly throughout, save senior Steve Rintoul.

Oregon's best golf may have been the practice round. Rob Huff sprayed his way to a three-day total of 237, 24 shots over par. Sophomore Tim Hval came in at 231. Croy Cochran shot a 229, and senior Tony Joyner had a 225.

Rintoul was the steadiest Duck as he took 12th place in the individual standings with a nine-over-par, 221.

Fresno State University captured the team title by one stroke over University of Arizona. UCLA's Richard Greenwood won the individual title at one-over-par, 214.

The Ducks, the second-place finisher in the Pacific 10 Conference the past two years, have stumbled in two straight tournaments against conference rivals. Arizona, Arizona State University, University of California, UCLA, USC and University of Washington have all rolled over Oregon in the past six days.
