## Women netters win pair; men finish 1-2 in Seattle

Heading north to Seattle for the weekend, the University of Oregon men's and women's tennis teams both experienced contrasting results as the women won a pair of matches and the men won one and lost two.

The women's team easily swept Seattle University 9-0 on Friday and then won a tough match against Puget Sound, 6-3, the following day. A third match against Seattle Pacific was cancelled.

Over on the mens side, the weekend results were but a game away from being judged a success. The Ducks lost convincingly to Washington (7-2) on Friday, dropped a heartbreaker to Idaho State University (5-4) and then skunked Seattle Pacific (9-0).

One of the brighter spots of the weekend were the three singles victories posted by Oregon's top player Pat Jennings, who won in straight sets on each occasion.

The Duck women got off to a good start on Friday against Seattle — a late replacement for scheduled Gonzaga. The singles matches were all decided in relatively easy fashion, as the Ducks walked away with an abundance of two-set victories. The doubles combinations performed equally as well, and the sweep was complete.

"Our girls all played really well this weekend," women's head coach Sue Jacobsen said. "Mentally we were really tough."

In the match with Puget Sound things weren't quite so easy, as Oregon's top two singles players, Kelly Stuart and Cindy Grall, went down

early. However, the remainder of the singles matches all went the Ducks' way, as Kumi Nagamoto, Liz O'Donnell, Helen Zech and Amber Goheen all forged victories.

Zech and Goheen, who both won three-set singles matches, then teamed up at the second doubles position for a three-set victory to preserve the team win. Nagamoto and Tracy Hinchliffe added the final match victory.

"Beating Puget Sound was one of our goals for this year," she said. "We're really happy about this victory."

"I was a little disappointed last weekend on our trip to Pullman (where the Ducks lost to Washington, Washington State, and Idaho State)," Jacobsen said. "I thought we should have been where we are this week — last week."

Jacobsen pointed to the upcoming matches against Washington and WSU this weekend in Eugene as coming at a good time. "If we can keep this (level of play) up, then I think we'll compete well against the Washington schools."

After beating both Linfield and Lewis and Clark last week, the men's team headed north looking to extend their streak. After the expected 7-2 loss to the Huskies, the Idaho State match went down to the wire.

The outcome was decided close to 1 a.m. on Saturday morning when the number-two doubles team of Sean Campbell and Peter Bartlett lost in a third set tie breaker 5-7, 6-2, 7-6 (10-8).

Later Saturday night, Oregon rebounded over the Falcons to end the weekend 1-2.

The Ducks played the final two matches against Idaho State and Seattle Pacific without its number-two singles player James Hazard, who sprained an ankle during last Thursday's practice.

"James played against Washington, but he wasn't able to continue after that," head coach Buzz Summers said. "I thought we would have beaten Idaho State if James had been healthy. We almost beat them without him."

Going into the weekend, sophomore Jennings had the idea to "win every match, singles and doubles" as Summers described it. Combining with Hazard for the victory against Washington, and Jamie Horne on the other two victories, plus his three singles wins, Jennings did just that.

The Ducks also finished two-three in the 1500, with Harold Kuphaldt (3:48.05) and Mark Dunbar (3:49.12) providing the scoring.
