

students to 20 hours of work per week at low wages. Since they can't afford to go to movies or some museums, it's not surprising that they remain isolated from—and sometimes hostile to—U.S. culture.

Above all, these students seem acutely aware that they're just passing through. Their younger brothers and sisters may be here for even shorter stays. In cooperation with such U.S. schools as the State University of New York and the Universities of Maryland and Texas, the Malaysian government is instituting two-year preparatory associate-degree programs back home that they hope will make adjustment easier at either end. The programs are designed to improve language skills, teach students about Islam in the United States (thus undercutting the potential influence of fundamentalist extremists) and introduce them in advance to the realities of U.S. life.

If, by instituting the last objective, the government hopes to ensure that its educated young return, there's probably little cause for worry. One Malaysian M.B.A. candidate is an anomaly when he says, "If I get a job that pays well, I'll stay." He adds: "Ultimately, I want to go back." Even Juneita of the Esprit T-shirt says, "I feel I don't belong here. It's a nice place to visit..." Adds her American fiancé, "...but not to stay."
