Duck women to take on Cal, BYU

All is well, and the Oregon women's track team aims to keep it that way.

The Ducks, coming off a thrilling first-place finish at the Pepsi Invitational last weekend, have just one more major hurdle to clear in the dual-meet season.

Brigham Young University, which Oregon faces Saturday at Hayward Field, is coach Tom Heinonen's primary concern. The Cougars handed the Ducks their only setback last season, 87-70. California will join the battle as well.

"This is the last week of the meat grinder," said Heinonen. "We don't need a letdown. I want to see close competition and a team win for the Ducks."

BYU, on the other hand, will heavily rely on a few exceptional individuals. Julie Jenkins has surpassed the NCAA-meet standard in the 800 and 1,500 meters. She finished fourth in last year's TAC 800 (2:01.55). Teammate Angela Cook, who placed eighth in the NCAA 1,500 a year ago, boasts a 3,000 best of 9:21, and Hui Chin Lee has thrown the javelin 180-9. In addition, the Cougar athletes should be fresh after two weeks' rest.

"We don't want to be surprised by these folks," said Heinonen, owner of a 52-6 dual-meet record. "This is our chance to be unbeaten in our dual-meet season."

He further cautioned, "We're

moving a few athletes into secondary events."

Ducks Katie O'Brien and Janell Thorsland, two 100-meter hurdle mainstays, will have their hands full, as BYU's Susan DeVries (14.07) and Cal's Raven Vlitiz (14.14) have both recorded faster times this year. The Cougars, however, will miss the services of Swedish long jump record-holder (21-1½) Eva Karblom, who will likely skip Saturday's meet while attempting to qualify for the NCAA heptathlon this week at the Mt. Sac. Relays.

The Golden Bears, who surrendered to the Ducks, 73-91, last season at Berkeley, boast Sheila Hudson, currently the fourth-best triple jumper in the country. Hudson, whose best mark last year was ranked fifth in the world, will be the favorite in the long jump, too.

Oregon netters follow lead of 3 freshmen to improve

Before the start of the 1987 season, Oregon women's tennis coach Sue Jacobsen found herself looking at a team laden with youth, inexperience and optimism.

Whether any of the above would translate into victories on the court was an open question.

With one more weekend of matches on the schedule, that question has been answered with an emphatic "yes." The Ducks, 11-7, face Washington State University today at 3 on the 15th Street courts, and then the University of Washington Saturday afternoon in a round-robin tournament that will

determine the Pacific 10 Conference Northern Division championship.

Perhaps the biggest reason for Oregon's turnaround from last year's 4-12 team has been the influence of three important freshmen. Kumi Nagamoto has made the most startling impact, coming over from Japan to run up a 16-3 record at the number-three singles slot this season.

"I was kind of scared at first," the soft-spoken Nagamoto said of the transition to American tennis. "But I didn't want to go to school in Japan." Nagamoto played down her success, merely saying "I always try my best."
