

It's no contest this time as Oregon men victimize Bears

Three members of the Oregon men's track team earned NCAA qualification on Saturday as the Ducks grounded out a methodical 93-70 dual-meet victory over the University of California at Hayward Field.

Cal was the last team to beat the Ducks (5-0 this season) in a dual-meet encounter, and Oregon edged the Golden Bears by a single point a year ago. But Cal fell behind too early to take most of the drama out of the meet, when the Ducks swept eight of the first nine scoring positions before a running event had been held.

The Ducks eventually moved out to a 48-2 advantage after six events before Cal began to answer. The final margin of victory was the widest in the dual-meet series between the two schools since 1962.

As expected, Oregon swept the hammer, javelin and pole vault. But it was the win in the 400-meter relay over the Bears' NCAA-bound team that set the early tone and put to rest any doubts coach Bill Dellinger had

about winning his 13th-straight dual meet.

The Golden Bears have run the short relay in 39.50 this year, but Oregon's Mark Dannis got the baton with a 5-meter lead over Cal's Atlee Mahorn in the anchor leg and held off the NCAA 200-meter runner-up to give the Ducks a season-best time of 40.75. The rout was on and the team competition was over almost before it began.

"They hadn't even gotten to their strongest events before the hole was too deep to get out of," Dellinger admitted. The high-water mark came after Pat Lanning (47.33) and Larry Williams (48.63) finished 1-3 in the 400 to stake the Ducks to an insurmountable 67-19 lead.

Dan Nelson made sure his third consecutive steeplechase would be his last of the regular season, winning the event in an NCAA-qualifying 8:42.41. "That was good to see," said Dellinger, who had predicted earlier in the week that Nelson would meet the standard.

Latin Berry added a spot in

Oregon women glide over Cal, BYU to stay undefeated

"O wild West Wind... Destroyer and Preserver; hear, O hear!"

The lines of poet Percy Shelley blew their way into Saturday's three-way track meet at Hayward Field, and when all had come to rest, Oregon's undefeated dual-meet record lay intact.

Riding a strong breeze, the Duck women glided past Brigham Young University, 95-40, and the University of California, 90-46.

"The wind had a lot to do with today's marks," said Oregon coach Tom Heinonen, whose dual-meet record soars to 53-6. "It certainly helped all the jumps."

Oregon's multi-talented Camille Jampolsky long jumped 19-10 in addition to placing first in the high jump (6-0) and lowering her 200-meter best to 24.8. Julie Goodrich's second-place long jump of 19-10½ would have been even more impressive if it wasn't for Cal's Sheila Hudson, who flew to 20-6. The world-class performer

also recorded a 43-10 triple jump, easily breaking the meet record.

Despite Hudson's marks, the Ducks clearly owned the day. By mid-meet Oregon had a commanding lead and went on to win all but eight events. "It was another one of those go-and-get-it-done efforts," said Heinonen, who feared a possible letdown after a long string of victories. "We got a whole passle of lifetime bests."

Yvette Brown threw the discus 165-10, good for second place and a new personal

record. More importantly, the junior from Vacaville, Calif., qualified for the Pacific 10 Conference meet, one of three Ducks to do so Saturday. Sprinter Vicky Galbert, a second-place finisher in the 100 meters (12.06), and 800-runner Stephanie Morris (2:11) raised

the total to 20 qualifiers.

Oregon's Stefanie Hunter had no problem altering her usual repertoire. Hunter, a 100-meter mainstay, shifted gears and scooted to a meet record in the 400 (55.66). She also turned in

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
