

Ducks split with 6th-ranked Cal in Howe Field opener

Howe Field opened in grand style Sunday afternoon as the Oregon Ducks and the University of California put on two thrilling performances, splitting a doubleheader, 4-2 and 6-0.

It was the first softball game ever played at Howe Field, and the first Pacific 10 Conference action the field has seen since the University's baseball team was dropped in 1981.

The Bears took the first game, 4-2, in 13 innings. Despite the loss, Oregon coach Teresa Wilson had nothing but praise for her players. "This was our best game of the year," she said. "I was very pleased with our hitting (the Ducks out hit Cal, 11-4), and Sue (Voeller) threw an excellent game. She kept the hitters off balance, and that's great when you can hold hitters like they have to one for six and oh (zero) for six."

Game one marked the return

of former Churchill High School pitcher Kim Moe, now of California. Voeller and Moe were locked in a scoreless pitcher's duel through nine innings.

In the top of the tenth, Cal pushed across two runs, but Oregon came back in the bottom of the inning with two of its own to tie the game.

In the 13th inning, a controversial call at first base allowed a California runner to score

from third with what turned out to be the winning run.

Oregon catcher Stacye Gustafson hit the Bears' Erin Cassidy with the ball on her throw to first trying to catch Cassidy. Cal's Caryn Williams scored from third, and despite an outpouring of protest from Oregon players, home plate umpire Tom Rollins allowed the run to stand.

Said Gustafson, "he (Rollins) gave them the game at that point. He took it right out of our hands."

"It's too bad a game like this had to end on a call like that," Wilson said. "I should have protested the game right there. There were two or three major controversial calls."

Moe gave up two runs on six hits, while Voeller allowed only two hits but took the loss. Voeller picked up one strikeout during the game, giving her 90 on the year, a new Oregon single-season record.

In the nightcap, the Ducks had no trouble putting up the runs they would need for their first conference win of the year. Vicki Fry walked to lead off,

reached second on a sacrifice bunt, and scored on a double by Gustafson. Oregon would go on to score one run each in the second, third, fifth, sixth, and seventh innings to back Sony Schroeder's five-hit shutout.

The Ducks pounded out nine hits in game two. Gustafson went two for three including a double, scored two runs and batted in one.

Jeanna King, now playing on a regular basis due to injuries, came through with a big game, going two for three with two RBI's, including a double in the seventh inning to score Schroeder.

Kira Lewis had three hits on the day, giving her 35 for the season as she closes in on the Oregon single-season record of 38, set last year by Susan Uhrich.

The Duck's record now goes to 19-24 (1-5 in Pac-10) with 10 games remaining. After their impressive showing against California, which was ranked sixth in the nation going into Sunday's action, the Ducks face nationally ranked UCLA in a doubleheader today at Howe Field at 1 p.m.

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Ducks another point at number-three doubles, winning 6-1, 6-4.

As usual, the play of the standout freshman from Japan drew Jacobsen's praise. "Kumi is the one player whose game doesn't come and go. If someone's going to beat her, they're going to have to come right out and do it."

All of this left the Ducks with a good feeling about what they accomplished this season, and an even better feeling about what's in store next year.

Oregon has already received three commitments of top players from the Northwest and northern California, and a

fourth is making a visit to campus this week.

Obviously, Jacobsen is very happy about the direction the Ducks are heading. "It's exciting. With what we've got coming in and what we're keeping, Washington has got to feel us breathing down their neck."

Staying put are four of Oregon's six singles players, including freshmen Kelly Stuart and Nagamoto, sophomore Cindy Grall, and Helen Zech, who will be the team's lone senior next year.

Another freshman Jacobsen is high on is Amber Goheen, who played with Zech at number-

two doubles this year. "Amber had some concentration problems but she is really maturing," Jacobsen said. "I don't know if we'll play her at singles next year, but she's a very strong doubles player."

There is no doubt that the Ducks can attribute their dramatic improvement in 1987 to the play of the freshman. With a full year of tennis under their belts, they can only get better. Add to that another outstanding recruiting class, and it's easy to see why next season can't seem to come soon enough for the Ducks.

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
