PLO offices closed

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — President Hosni Mubarak's government retaliated Monday against PLO criticism by shutting down the organization's offices in Egypt.

The break marks the most severe crisis between Egypt and the Palestine Liberation Organization since PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat resumed relations with Cairo in late 1983.

At that time, Arafat came personally to Egypt to thank Mubarak for his help in providing protection for PLO forces evacuated from Lebanon following the Israeli invasion of Lebanon in June 1982. Arafat has visited Egypt several times since then.

A statement read Monday by Egyptian Foreign Minister Esmat Abdel-Meguid implied that Palestinian officials might be expelled.

Soviet published

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail Bulgakov's "The Heart of the Dog," a biting satire of Soviet society of the 1920s, will be published in the author's homeland for the first time in June, a literary magazine said Monday. Western literary critics say the novella, written in 1925, is among Bulgakov's finest works.

The Soviet literary magazine, "The Banner," announced in its May edition that it would publish the story in the June issue.

The decision was the latest in a series of steps taken under Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gor-

bachov to give wider exposure to writers and cultural figures who were censored or banned during their lifetimes.

National

Twelve still missing

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — Workers were buoyed Monday by the discovery of open spaces in the wreckage of a collapsed apartment building, while unions set up a relief fund and volunteers from as far away as California offered to help in the search for 12 men still missing.

Mayor Thomas Bucci said 16 bodies had been recovered from the L'Ambiance Plaza by Monday evening, four days after the building collapsed. The search will be treated as a rescue operation until at least Saturday, the mayor said.

Firm registered planes

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The law firm that employs Lawrence E. Walsh, the independent counsel investigating the Iran-Contra affair, also handled the registration for two aircraft that were used to ship missiles to Iran, it was reported Monday.

Records from the Federal Aviation Administration's registration office in Oklahoma City showed that the firm of Crowe & Dunlevy registered three Boeing 707 aircraft belonging to Southern Air Transport of Miami, radio station KTOK and The Oklahoma Gazette reported.

Two of the aircraft were later used to carry weapons to the Mideast as part of the sale of

U.S. arms to Iran, said the report.

North potential target

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former White House aide Lt. Col. Oliver North is under around-the-clock protection because of recent death threats he has received, Pentagon sources said late Monday.

Several sources, who asked not to be identified, confirmed that North and his Great Falls, Va., house are being guarded by agents of the Naval Investigative Service. Agents have set up a command post at North's home and accompany him to his Marine Corps job and on family outings, officials said. North has been working at Marine headquarters next to the Pentagon in Virginia.

One source said there is "reason to believe that North is considered a target" by terrorists. He did not elaborate, however.

Webster to testify

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director William Webster will testify again Thursday before the Senate Intelligence Committee on his confirmation to become head of the CIA, the panel said Monday.

Committee chairman Sen. David L. Boren, D-Okla., and other committee members want to question Webster about numerous references in FBI files to former National Security Council aide Oliver North, who was fired last November and has become one of the main figures in the Iran-Contra affair.

Senators on the panel "in general felt it was important to clarify ... issues concerning several memos" in FBI field offices "that may or may not have been transmitted to headquarters," said the intelligence committee's vice chairman, Sen. William Richard Cohen, R-Maine.

PTL taxing reviewed

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) —

The Internal Revenue Service wants to revoke the PTL's tax-exempt status for a three-year period because a "substantial portion" of its earnings benefited Jim Bakker, his relatives and other PTL officers, according to a published report.

The IRS said in a confidential 1985 report that Bakker was paid nearly \$1 million more than the agency deemed reasonable from 1981-83. The Charlotte Observer reported in its Tuesday editions.

The IRS contended that Bakker and other officers spent money lavishly, holding \$8,000-dinner parties and renting \$350-a-night hotel rooms, the newspaper said. The agency also said PTL failed to report all of Bakker's income on his W-2 forms, the Observer said.

Diver killed

REEDSPORT (AP) — A 27-year-old Reedsport man died after he fell about 25 feet into rocks while diving at Loon Lake, Douglas County deputies said.

Arne E. Johansen was pronounced dead Sunday at Lower Umpqua Hospital here after suffering a massive skull fracture in the fall, deputies said.

Johansen and friends were diving off rocks when he slipped and fell, hitting his head and chest on rocks on the shore before falling into the water, deputies said.

Bystanders pulled him from the water, but were unable to revive him, deputies said.

License revoked

COOS BAY (AP) — The owner of a day-care center closed down amid allegations of sexual abuse said Monday she lost faith in the system after a hearing officer upheld the revocation of her operating license.

"It's the system that's at fault," said Debbie

Loudenbeck, owner of Kiddie Kastle. "It's just appalling people have to go to this degree to fight an agency with so much power."

She learned Friday that state hearings officer Mary Wagner had upheld the order from the State Children's Services Division revoking the day-care license for Kiddie Kastle.

Loudenbeck said she is discussing with her lawyers whether to continue fighting the case in the Oregon Court of Appeals.

Spraying begins

GLIDE (AP) — The opening salvo in the annual battle against the gypsy moth was fired Monday when a helicopter sprayed about 1,500 acres of forest in eastern Douglas County.

Plans call for also spraying the biological pesticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* on infestations of the leaf-eating caterpillar in Douglas, Lane, Marion, Washington and Clackamas counties.

The biological pesticide known as B.t. is sprayed on foliage as the caterpillars emerge from buff-colored egg masses laid by adult moths the year before.

The caterpillars eat the leaves sprayed with B.t., which disrupts their digestive tracts.

YCC bill gains

SALEM (AP) — A Senate committee has given a boost to a bill that would create a state youth conservation corps — a four-year-old idea that apparently lacks only money.

The Government Operations & Elections Committee approved the measure Monday following a hearing and sent it, without any money attached, to the Joint Ways & Means Committee.

It will be up to the budget panel whether the corps idea gets off the ground.

The bill, SB731, would establish a program to employ people ages 17-23 in natural resources projects.
