#### Police search building

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police using masked witnesses raided headquarters of a black union Wednesday, apparently looking for suspects in the killing of four railway workers, while riot police circled the 11-story building.

Police spokesman Lt. Pierre Louw said 11 people, ages 12 to 49, were arrested in the seven-hour search of the downtown building, the South African Press Association reported without giving other details.

Jay Naidoo, general-secretary of the Congress of South African Trade Unions, or COSATU, said "police systematically searched" 400 workers in the main hall, and "proceeded to search

the building from top to bottom."

#### GE conflict alleged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressman suggested Wednesday that General Electric Corp., a major defense contractor, be required to divest itself of NBC because of a potential conflict of interest in owning a news organization.

But news chiefs of the three networks insisted there would be wholesale resignations, including theirs, should any parent company seek to influence a network news division.

However, Rep. Jim Slattery, D-Kans., contended that an ap-

pearance of conflict of interest could be as damaging as actual conflict of interest.

#### New embassy is urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Intelligence Committee recommended on a 15-0 vote Wednesday that new U.S. Embassy offices in Moscow be torn down and another structure erected because the incomplete building is "a giant antenna."

The two senior members of the panel said at a news conference that the U.S. government also should consider forcing the Soviets to vacate residences they have occupied since 1979 at their new embassy complex atop a high hill intelligence experts say allows them to eavesdrop on official

#### Court refuses practice

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Supreme Court on Wednesday refused to allow former anti-war radical David S. Fine, who took part in a fatal 1970 college bombing, to practice law in Oregon.

In its unanimous decision, the Supreme Court said Fine hasn't shown the character necessary for admission to the Oregon State Bar.

"We are not convinced of applicant's candor," the court said. "He has not shown himself to be a credible person and did not establish that he has the good moral character required to practice law."

#### Boy convicted of murder

EUGENE (AP) — A 17-year-old boy has been convicted of felony murder and first-degree robbery for his role in the clubbing death of a 91-year-old Cottage Grove-area man.

Jurors returned the verdict against Daniel Edward Buchholz on Tuesday after deliberating a day and a half.

Buchholz smiled and talked with friends in the audience as he entered the courtroom to hear the verdict, but he sat motionless after it was announced.

The Eugene youth faces a mandatory sentence of life in prison with a minimum term of 10 to 25 years. Lane County Circuit Judge Greg Foote ordered a presentence investigation.
