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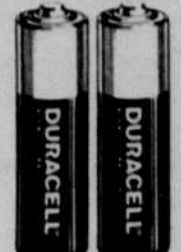

Oregon 'demoralizes' Vikings

The Oregon softball team demoralized the Portland State University Vikings Tuesday afternoon at Erv Lind Stadium in Portland, sweeping a double-header, 9-1 and 12-0.

With the two wins, Oregon sweeps the season series with the Vikings, 8-0.

The Ducks had everything go their way in game one, pound-

ing out nine hits. The nine runs scored in the opener, until the second game, was Oregon's most productive output of the season.

Oregon pitcher Sue Voeller pitched seven strong innings for her 14th win of the season, giving up one run on six hits.

Voeller helped her own cause, going three for four at the plate, scoring two runs and driving in two more.

The Ducks jumped all over the Vikes in the first inning, drawing four walks off PSU pitcher Traci Moen, including two free passes with the bases loaded.

The other Vikings helped a bit, committing three errors in the inning, and PSU had dug itself a hole it would never get out of, allowing five Duck runs to score.

Oregon added a two-spot in the seventh inning, including a triple by Cheryl Coryell which scored Stacye Gustafson. Coryell was brought in on an infield single by Voeller.

"I was expecting our kids to come out a little flat today after what happened in our last game (an extra-inning loss in the nightcap of the Oregon State double-header)," said coach Teresa Wilson. "But things worked out really well for us today."

"Like John (assistant coach Rittman) said, Portland State just got used to losing to us, and that continued in the second game," she added.

In the nightcap, the Ducks turned it up another notch, playing flawless ball and making things worse for PSU.

Oregon pushed across two runs in the first. Whatever chance the Vikings had disappeared in the top of the third, when the Ducks erupted for eight runs off five hits, highlighted by Voeller's triple to left-center with the bases loaded. Gustafson picked up Voeller with a single down the left field line, and Oregon had already surpassed the nine runs it scored in game one.

"It was getting difficult to stay motivated," said Ducks shortstop Paula Barnes. "We just kept scoring all those runs."

Sony Schroeder (9-13) got the win in game two, allowing only three hits for her third shutout of the season.

The Ducks head into their final two games of the season, a double-header with Pacific University next Saturday at Howe Field, with an overall record of 23-28, (2-8 in the Pacific 10 Conference).

The Oregon lacrosse team fell to Williamette University, 9-5.

In a makeup game, the Oregon baseball team defeated Lane Community College, 8-4, on Tuesday. The Ducks were blanked by Concordia College, 13-0, on Monday in Portland. Their record is now 2-9.

prove continuous residence since Jan. 1, 1987," she said.

Every family member must individually prove residency and apply for amnesty. In some cases, families will be forced apart because the husband may qualify while the wife may not, she said.

Salvadoran and Guatemalan refugees now find themselves in an extremely difficult position, according to Javier Castro, a Salvadoran refugee and a representative of the Interfaith Sanctuary Network.

"One million Salvadorans and Guatemalans don't have a country to go to," he said. "Duarte's government recently said that he doesn't want the Salvadorans back in the country. The Canadian government recently closed down the border for Salvadorans and Guatemalans. After this bill, we

are going to be persecuted by the INS (Immigration and Naturalization Service), and where are we going to go?"

Castro and other members of Eugene's refugee community are involved in a campaign to repeal the new legislation. They are collecting signatures, which they plan to send to Congress.

Oscar Hernandez, the director of MEChA, the Chicano-Latino Student Union at the University, said he believes the new legislation will generate more discrimination toward Spanish-speaking people.

"This law will make things worse for Spanish-speaking people. Our main concern as students is to provide some kind of network that we can help people and direct them to the right places where they can get some help," he said.
