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Extension service suffers setback

Of the EmeraldThe Lane County Extension
Service is once again out of
luck.The Eugene City Council on
Wednesday failed to approve a
special service district for the
extension service. The exten-
sion service needed the city's
approval of the county wide
special district in order to levy a
property tax.City Council members,
however, believe the extension
service is the county's
responsibility.Because of budget cutbacks,
Lane County reduced its con-
tribution to the extension ser-
vice from \$145,000 in 1981 to
\$50,000 for 1986-87. The coun-
ty should be providing the exten-
sion service with at least
\$300,000 a year, according to
senior extension agent Steve
Woodward.Many extension service sup-
porters showed up at Wednes-day's City Council meeting. The
supporters had expected to hear
a report on the legal feasibility
of the district, but the city at-
torneys had not completed the
report."Because of my experience
with the Lane County Extension
Service, I'm eager and hopeful
for the investigation," said City
Council member Cynthia
Wooten.However, when Wooten
made a motion to continue the
attorneys' investigation, none
of the council members agreed."I can't see any reason why
the county commissioners
should function as a separate
board and raise funds separately
for this one project," said coun-
cil member Emily Schue.
"There's a framework now
that's fully capable of doing the
same thing and going to the
voters and asking for the
money."

"The people on the City

Council do not understand that
a large number of the users of
those services are residents of
the city," said Lon Topaz,
chairman of Volunteers for the
Extension.The extension service now
plans to go back to the Board of
Commissioners at the next
budget meeting on May 19. "If
they can't agree to fund it, then
they ought to at least authorize a
serial levy for three years,"
Topaz said.Topaz also mentioned peti-
tioning the city, but would need
the support of the extension
volunteers first."The preferred route would
be to continue to be funded the
way we have the last 75 years
and simply have the commis-
sioners provide the funding,"
Woodward said. "The base prob-
lem is the fact that Lane Coun-
ty has been unable to get a
reasonable tax base for county
services," added Topaz.

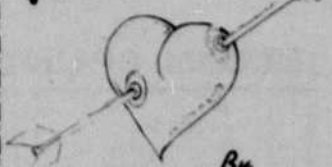

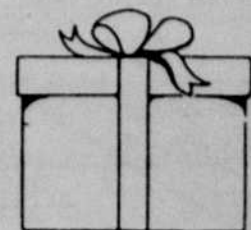
