

Auction of celebrity memorabilia benefits camp for cancer victims

The Celebrity Auction is being held as a part of the University Inn's first Spring Carnival on Saturday May 16. All proceeds from the auction will go to Camp Ukandu, a summer camp held near Mt. Hood for cancer victims ages 9 to 18. The camp relies on donations in order to operate.

UI student manager Joe Arndt came up with the idea for the auction in January, and since then several UI students have been contacting record companies, athletic teams, names

Contacting the celebrities was the hardest part of the whole event, Arndt said. However the work seems to have paid off. Autographed photographs were submitted by Robert Redford, Bob Hope, Dudley Moore, Ray Charles and the Eurythmics, as well as from athletes such as Steve Largent, Alex English and Fran Tarkenton.

Other articles include a script from the film "About Last Night" signed by Demi Moore, a signed comedy album by Joan Rivers, a Penzoil container signed by Arnold Palmer, and a "Three Amigos" movie poster signed by Director John Landis.

Prior to the auction, which begins at 5 p.m., there will be

He said a solution probably will be decided upon by early next week.

Two optional solutions that should work well for Jewish students and the rest of the University include moving registration ahead one day to Wednesday, Sept. 23, or allowing Jewish students to preregister, Sokol said.

If Jewish students had to miss registration because of the holiday, and then register later than other students, "our schedules would be screwed up very badly," Sokol said.

A similar problem occurred in 1983 when spring registration conflicted with Passover.

Sills could not be reached at the Hillel Center.

"Everyone is being very cooperative," Sokol said. The JSU is circulating a petition that they will present to Chereck on Friday for reinforcement of their position.
