located between Franklin Boulevard and the Willamette River and is owned by the State Board of Higher Education.

The project might result in one million square feet of development with an estimated 3,300 tenants employed in industrial research and development, data processing and computer software development.

Decker said another public hearing will be held before the end of 1987 and before final decisions are made.

Other buildings may be affected by construction, including the Manor Motel, but Decker could "pretty much guarantee" the cider mill wouldn't be disturbed, she said.

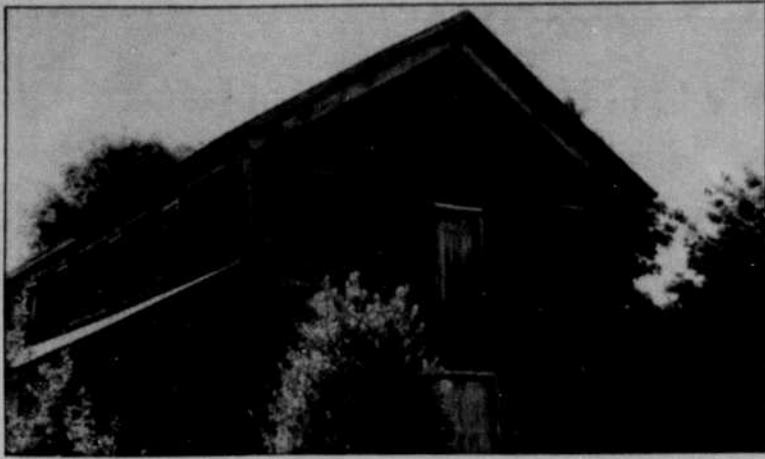

tion-failures was the proposed food store. "I think the food store is a good idea, but I don't think we could have pulled it off this year and made it the success that everyone wanted it to be," Nelson said.

Through everything though, Nelson has enjoyed his year and would do it again, he said.

"I really enjoy the work this job involves. I really haven't enjoyed a lot of the ceremonial things that go with it. I enjoy working on projects like we have like child care and insurance and getting things accomplished.

"I've joked with Lynn Pinkney (Nelson's predecessor) before that this really ought to be a two-year position. You finally get to this point — I have

two days left and I feel I know just about everything I would need to know, and God, if I had another year, I could do a lot of great things," Nelson said.

"The other hand of that is I wouldn't make it through another year. I've taken no more than eight credits a term this whole year, so I'm really far behind in terms of school. And energy-wise, I'm drained," he added.

Vice President for Administration Dan Williams praised Nelson as a strong administrator.

"My sense is that he and his staff did a first-rate job," he said. "Their work was well-reasoned and they never lost sight that they were here to serve students first."

Nelson will be connected with the insurance committee next year, but that will be the extent of his student government involvement. Next year, he will be at Oregon Hall working for Shirley Wilson, dean of students, and Gerry Moseley, vice-provost for student affairs, on child care and minority student issues.

Nelson isn't sure if his political career will continue past the ASUO. He has a summer internship in Washington D.C. with Congressman Ron Wyden from Portland.

"I'll see what Washington D.C. is like. Boy I sure don't know what I'm going to do now. I'd like to go to law school someday. I can't think past that," he said.

Proposed solutions include:

- Covering sexual harassment with a special rule, with procedures that are different from those for discrimination and other grievances.
- Calling for the establishment of a grievance counselor whose role would be to assist the grievant in formulating and following up his or her complaint.
- Establishing a clear definition of sexual harassment.
- Establishing guidelines for dealing with informal and formal complaints.
- Retaining records of complaints indefinitely.
- Establishing an educational program on campus to raise awareness about sexual harassment.

Wolin's book *Politics and Vision: Continuity and Innovation in Western Political Thought*, (1960) is considered a seminal work in contemporary political theory. His other books include *Hobbes* (1970) and *The Berkeley Rebellion and Beyond* (1970 with John Schaar). In addition, he has published more than 60 articles in the areas of political theory, revolution, and the relationships between religion and politics. He serves on the editorial board of *Political Theory* and was the founding editor of *Democracy*.

Professor Wolin's talk is part of the University of Oregon's celebration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution and is sponsored by the University of Oregon Center for the Humanities, the Oregon State University Center for the Humanities and a grant from the John Ben Snow Memorial trust. The event is free and open to the public.
