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Legislative update

Parental leave, higher gasoline tax move step closer to becoming law

House Bill 2321, the parental-leave bill, is on its way to Gov. Neil Goldschmidt for his signature after gaining House approval on Thursday.

The bill, which passed by a 38-21 margin in the House, received final Senate approval last Tuesday 22-6. The governor has made no indication of whether he will sign the bill.

The bill gives parents the right to take up to 12 weeks combined leave time to care for a newborn or newly adopted infant. The bill affects only those companies employing more than 25 workers.

Rep. Mike Kopetski, D-Salem, sponsor of the bill, noted that most of the benefits of the bill will be reaped by infants whose working parents would be allowed to be with them for the first months of life.

Last Wednesday a bill requiring drunk drivers who fail a breath test to wait 30 days before receiving an occupational drivers' license passed the Senate 19-11. The time frame for second-time offenders wishing to get an occupational license would be moved from 90 days to one year. An occupational license allows a person

whose license has been suspended to drive to and from work only.

On Thursday, following passage of Measure 2, the "school safety net measure," the House Revenue Committee opened hearings on a bill to form a governor's commission on school financing. The purpose is to try to solve the state's school budgeting problems.

When Goldschmidt took office earlier this year school finance was near the top of his list of concerns.

On Friday the House approved a \$542 million higher-education budget for the 1987-88 fiscal year. The bill now goes to the Senate.

Tuesday the House Revenue Committee approved 7-1 a bill that would increase the state's 12-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax by an additional 6 cents.

The bill, HB 2112, after weeks of contention in committee over the controversial plan, will now go to the full House for approval.

The gasoline tax increase, if approved, is expected to raise \$1.2 million over the next 10 years in state highway funds.

The bill also would double the current auto registration fee from \$10 to \$20.

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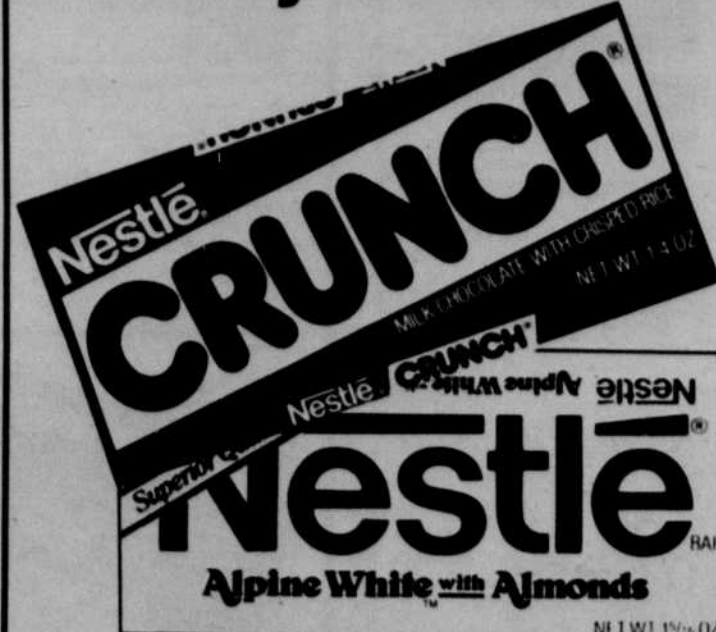
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
