shot put), and scored in 19 of the 21 events held.

By comparison, the runner-up Ducks produced two individual champions (JJ Birden in the long jump and Latin Berry in the triple jump), and scored in 16 of 21 events, but four of those were just fifth- or sixth-place finishes worth two and one points, respectively.

To make matters worse, Oregon was thwarted in the distances, which are usually its strong suit. Charted to produce around 60 points, the 800-, 1,500-, 5,000- and 10,000-meter races resulted in just 29 instead.

Only the yeoman-like efforts of fifth-year senior Dan Nelson prevented further damage. Nelson, Oregon's top point producer on the track, came back from a second-place finish in the grueling steeplechase on Friday to finish third in the 5,000.

Dellinger had hoped for more. Oregon runners own the two fastest times in the conference, and four of the top six, at both distances. The Webfoot mentor was optimistic about sweeping the top three scoring positions in one or both races, but Harold Kuphardt, Mark Dunbar and Eric Petersen swept the last three (finishing 4-5-6) instead at 1,500 meters, and Nelson was the Ducks' lone scorer in the 5,000.

Berry and Birden led Oregon to a more satisfactory showing in the field events. The Ducks finished 1-2 in both the long jump and the triple jump, sophomore Jose de Souza placed behind UCLA's Banich in both the discus and the shot, and Spencer Williams repeated last year's runner-up showing in the triple jump.

Berry overhauled Williams on his last attempt to win the triple jump as he soared 53-6 1/4 to eclipse his previous personal record by over 11 inches. More significantly, the mark qualified Berry for the 1988 Olympic Trials. The standards for the trials are higher than those for either the NCAA or TAC, and Berry became the first Duck to qualify since the window open-

ed about two weeks ago.

Williams, who had just leaped 52-8 1/4 to better his non-windy personal record by a whopping 14 inches, led the cheers as Berry came down the runway for his last attempt, and celebrated the victory that came at his own expense.

Birden won the long jump on

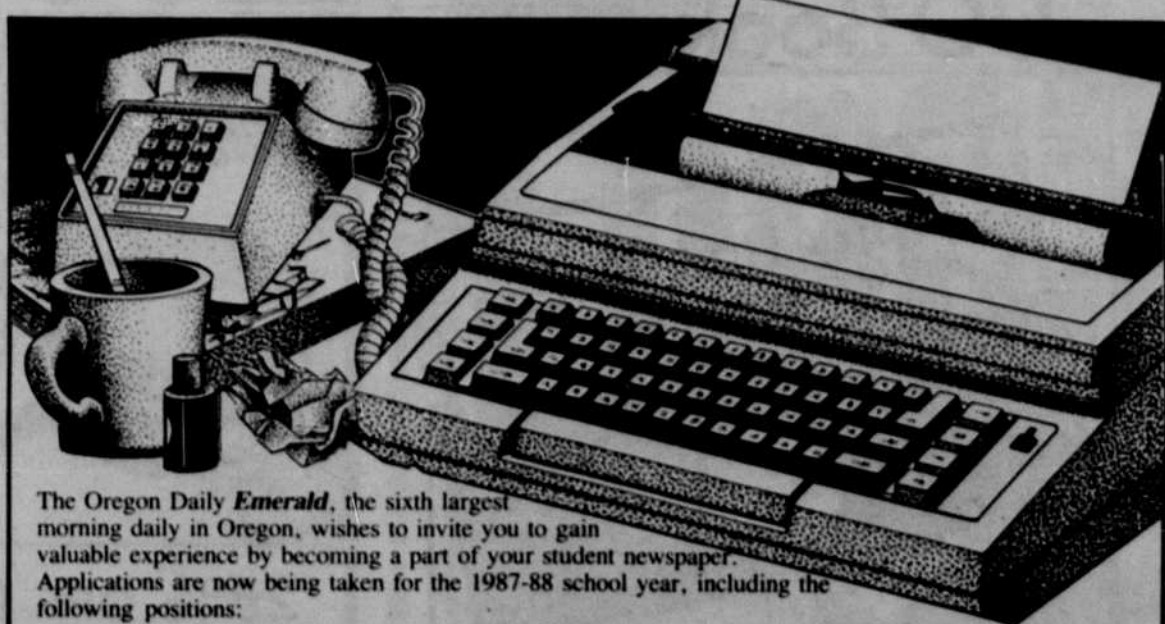
Friday with a personal record mark of 25-8 1/4, while Berry added over two inches to his own personal record in the event to place second (25-7 1/4).

Birden had jumped a wind-aided 26-1 1/2 earlier this season, but his mark on Friday was four inches beyond his previous non-windy best.
