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## Substitutes who wouldn't work face decision from district, EEA

Eugene school district and EEA officials will meet at 10 a.m. June 1 to settle the fate of substitute teachers who refused to work during the district's recent teacher strike.

If a settlement is not reached, the intention of the school board is to implement the substitute's contract and remove them from a master list of teachers used by the district, according to Gay Campbell, district spokesperson.

The school district's attorney, Joe Richards, contacted the EEA by letter after last week's board meeting to request a meeting of the two sides. When a new contract was agreed upon in early May, both sides chose June 1 as the deadline for deciding what to do about the substitutes, Campbell said.

Of 250 substitutes on the district's master list, 66 worked for the district during the strike, according to Campbell. Of the remaining 184, many were unable to fill in for striking teachers because of prior teaching commitments or illness, she added.

Only those substitutes that refused to cross picket lines against their contract terms will be subject to the terms agreed upon on Monday, June 1st Campbell said.

If a settlement is not reached and the

district cuts the targeted substitutes from their master list, "morale will quickly reduce to terrible," said Ray Gross, president of the EEA.

"Ideally we would like total amnesty for substitutes," Gross said.

"The school district has never been able to operate well within an eight-hour day," Gross said. Should a satisfactory settlement not be reached by June 1, Gross said he heard some teachers say they would "work to rule" in protest.

Instead of putting in the additional hours most teachers voluntarily work to do a good job, Gross said some teachers would work only the eight required hours per day that their contract stipulates.

Satisfactory treatment of the abstaining substitutes is very important to now-working teachers, according to Gross.

Since settlement of the strike, teacher morale has been good in schools where administrators "behaved appropriately" during the strike, according to Gross. Administrators who realized the circumstances of the teacher's actions and did not actively antagonize them by "openly welcoming" substitutes have found their relations with returning teachers to be good, he added.

In schools where antagonisms did occur, Gross said morale is still not the best.

## IFC allows new positions

The new Incidental Fee Committee met officially for the first time Thursday and approved the creation of new Executive positions.

The proposal was presented by ASUO President Kasey Brooks and Vice President Karen Gaffney and would reinstate the Record assistant editor and assistant University affairs coordinator. These positions were not included in the 1987-88 ASUO budget.

The proposal also created an Athletic Department liaison and an elections coordinator.

The Athletic Department liaison position sparked the most discussion of the evening. Committee member Armando Morales expressed concern about the role of the liaison.

"I envision someone being able to go the Athletic Department and spend time looking at the budget," Gaffney said, and went on to explain she and Brooks want to ensure student involvement in the Athletic Department.

Morales then expressed concern about who is hired for the position.

"I want someone who is nothing to the Athletic Department," he said, adding he supports the program, but would like to see the person hired have

no interest in the Athletic Department.

"To exclude a person just because he is an athlete is to discriminate," Brooks said.

Committee Chairman pro-tem Bob Baldwin had other concerns.

"I am concerned not so much about who is doing the job, but is there really 48 hours a month for nine months worth of work," he said.

"What I have witnessed during the past three years is that there are a large number of students who are not comfortable with the Athletic Department," Gaffney said, and added she is committed to making sure students understand what goes on in the Athletic Department.

The liaison would not only work with the budget, but would write a policy concerning spouse/spousal equivalent certification, and help balance Athletic Department publicity with that of the EMU and ASUO program.

The elections coordinator will be responsible for overseeing the Westmoreland Tennants Council elections in October, as well as updating the current ASUO election process.

Once discussion ended, the committee unanimously approved 6-0 the budget transfers allowing all four positions.

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
