At last we add Oregon to a growing list of growing opposition to the oppressive policies of the South African government, said Rep. Margret Carter, D-Portland, primary sponsor of the bill.

"We will no longer allow our money to be used to oppress the people of South Africa," she said.

"Some of us have voted for this measure several times," said Vera Katz, D-Portland, speaker of the House.

"Several of us thought this would happen last session and now it is not only time to thank the legislators but it is time to thank the governor," Katz said.

In late April the long-contested legislation glided through the House 51-9 and this month gained strong Senate approval on a 22-8 vote.

Divestment legislation has

been considered by the legislature in each of the past five sessions, Carter said.

Legislative sessions are held once every two years in Oregon.

In the 1979 session the bill died in committee. In following years the bill has moved closer to passage, and in 1985 the bill gained approval in both the House and the Senate. Then Gov. Vic Atiyeh, however, refused to sign the bill into law.

Atiyeh refused to sign the bill, Carter said, in part because State Treasurer Bill Rutherford did not believe the move would be prudent and could hurt Oregon investors.

Earlier this session, however, Rutherford approved a plan to liquidate \$800 million in state funds invested in South Africa.

The bill, however, would not allow divestment of state funds "through the back door," Carter

said. "That's something we couldn't get," she said.

These types of back door investments would include money invested in international corporations that in turn have invested money in South Africa, she said.

She noted 36 major corporations have pulled finances out of South Africa.

During the last gubernatorial race, Goldschmidt, as part of his campaign platform, said he would support legislation to divest state funds from the racially torn African nation.

The bill will take affect 90 days from the day it was signed, and at that time the state will have to begin withdrawing money from South African investments.

bell. In addition, "Without the help of Dale Grace and Bill McChesney and the Oregon Track Club, we couldn't have done it," Dix said. Although Dix said he is obviously pleased with the vote, there still is much to be done.

"We've gone from being

almost ready to give up to elation," said McChesney, who is president of the OTC. The 300-member OTC's main objective is to help University track and field programs and maintain the continual upgrading of the Hayward facilities. It already has helped to raise

\$460,000 of the estimated \$1.8 million necessary for improvements, he said.

"(Hayward Field) won't be on the level of Tampa or Indianapolis, but we will have a facility that matches our reputation," said Sen. Grattan Kerans, D-Eugene. Kerans said he believes track and field provides the greatest sports contribution to the city and state, both in terms of the positive economic impact and image to Oregon. "The bill is a recognition of that," Kerans said.

The renovation is long overdue and necessary to keep Eugene in first-class competition, Kerans said.

Money from the sale of the bonds will be used to renovate East and West grandstands and West Grandstand Field House, resurface and reconfigure the main Hayward track, build a new warm-up track, weight-room and storage structure.

The University Athletic Department, which initially had reservations about how the bonds were to be repaid, was pleased with the advancement of the bill, according to Sandy Walton, assistant athletic director for financial management.

The cities of Eugene and Springfield tentatively have agreed to a 0.5 percent increase in the local room tax, which is expected to raise about \$90,000 a year.

In addition, Lane County has agreed to contribute another \$10,000 a year from its percentage of the room tax. The University has pledged to contribute an additional \$15,000 yearly to the project, which would come primarily from a surcharge on tickets for Hayward Field track meets.
