### International President in Italy

VENICE, Italy (AP) — President Reagan, urging Western solidarity in coping with world economic problems and dealing with the Soviets, arrived in Italy Wednesday to prepare for a summit of industrialized democracies.

Reagan got a low-key, red-carpet greeting as he arrived at Marco Polo Airport here and was welcomed by Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani.

Before leaving the White House, Reagan asserted that international prosperity and free markets "are everybody's business" and called for an end to the trade and monetary imbalances that plague the world's largest industrial democracies.

### National Money set aside

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iranian-American businessman Albert Hakim testified Wednesday that \$200,000 in profits from the sale of U.S. arms to Iran was set aside "as a death benefit" for the family of former White House aide Oliver L. North.

The account, under the code name "Button," has now grown to \$216,000, including interest, in a Swiss bank.

During three hours of testimony at the Iran-Contra hearings, Hakim also declared that he had been told that his activities in connection with the arms sales and with a North-directed private network supporting the Nicaraguan rebels had the approval of President Reagan.

### Attack accounts vary

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Iraqi pilot who attacked the USS Stark in the Persian Gulf claims he opened fire because he was convinced the ship was in an Iranian-declared war zone, but records show otherwise, the Pentagon said Wednesday.

Releasing the most detailed report on the May 17 incident to

date, the Defense Department said American officials challenged the Iraqi claims about the Stark's precise location during the course of a recently completed joint investigation.

But the Iraqis still "strongly maintain" the ship was inside the so-called Iranian exclusion zone and thus subject to attack, the Pentagon said.

### Controllers needed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department said Wednesday it plans to divert \$51.5 million and hire 955 additional air traffic controllers, supervisors and managers to meet unexpected traffic growth next year.

Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole advised Congress of the department's plans in letters to the chairmen of both the House and Senate transportation appropriations subcommittees.

She acknowledged the new controllers likely will not be in a position to actually direct planes until late next year. But, because it takes nearly a year to train a controller, "it is imperative...that we put additional resources into the pipeline starting early this fall," she said.

### AIDS costs predicted

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — The cost of treating AIDS patients in the United States likely will exceed \$37 billion for the five years ending in mid-1991, the Rand Corp. said Wednesday.

Under a worst case, the cost could go as high as \$113 billion if there is a large rise in the number of AIDS patients and in the cost of health care, a researcher said.

The \$37.6 billion "best guess" estimate, including \$10.2 billion paid by Medicaid, "doesn't sound like a number that's going to break the bank" because it would represent 1 percent of total U.S. health care costs and 3 percent of Medicaid costs for the period, said Rand economist Anthony Pascal.

But unless policy decisions

'are made about who should pay, Pascal predicted a disproportionate share of the costs will be paid by poorer workers who contribute to private health insurance plans, state and city governments in areas with large numbers of AIDS patients, and the AIDS patients themselves.

### Business urged out

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rev. Leon Sullivan, saying his widely used fair-employment principles have failed to bring an end to South Africa's apartheid, called on nearly 200 American businesses Wednesday to pull out of that nation within nine months.

Sullivan, a Philadelphia Baptist minister whose 10-year-old code of conduct has become the standard for U.S. companies in South Africa, also said he wants the U.S. government to enact an economic embargo against South Africa.

In a telegram to President Reagan, he asked the United States to sever diplomatic relations "until statutory apartheid is ended and blacks have a clear commitment for equal political rights."

More than 100 American companies have sold their South African subsidiaries over the last 18 months.

### Tape to be released

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge on Wednesday ordered NASA to make public the tape-recording of the last words spoken by the shuttle Challenger's crew as the spaceship exploded shortly after takeoff 16 months ago.

U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson, in a nine-page opinion, rejected arguments by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration that release of the tape would violate the privacy of the families of the seven dead astronauts and would subject the survivors again to the news media's "morbid fascination" with their grief.

Johnson instead agreed with arguments made by attorneys for The New York Times that

the tape "contains no information about the astronauts or any of their family members" and therefore should be released. She ordered that the tape be given to the newspaper within 30 days.

### Regional

#### Funding bill passed

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's gasoline tax and auto registration fee would increase sharply under a \$1 billion highway funding bill passed Wednesday by

the Oregon House.

The measure would boost the gas tax by 6 cents a gallon, to a total of 18 cents, over the next three years. It also would double the two-year auto registration fee to \$40.

The proposed tax and fee increases would generate an additional \$1.1 billion for highway programs during the next decade.

Backers of House Bill 2112, which was sent to the Senate on a 34-26 vote, said highways are crucial to the state's economy and must be taken care of.
