Release demanded

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syria said Saturday it would not wait long for kidnappers to release American journalist Charles Glass, but a Shiite Moslem leader reportedly warned Glass might be killed if Syria attacks.

The Syrian military command in Beirut called for the quick and unconditional release of Glass, 36, of Los Angeles; and Ali Osseiran, 40, son of Lebanon's Defense Minister Adel Osseiran, said sources close to the command who spoke anonymously.

Fourteen kidnappers grabbed the pair Wednesday in south Beirut's seaside Ouzai district. It was the first abduction of a foreigner in Lebanon since the Syrians entered Moslem west Beirut Feb. 22, and it raised the number of kidnapped Americans to nine.

U.S. ships threatened

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iranian Prime Minister Hussein Musavi on Saturday threatened "crushing blows" against U.S. targets in the Persian Gulf after Iraqi planes attacked an Iran-bound oil tanker to end a one-month lull.

Iran has evidence that Kuwait provided the facilities for an air strike at dawn Saturday against the tanker in the northern gulf, Musavi said in a Tehran Radio broadcast monitored in Nicosia.

He did not elaborate, but the Iranians have charged in the past that Iraqi warplanes regularly fly through Kuwaiti air space on their way to attack ships and that Kuwait aids Iraq in its six-year war with Iran.

Test conducted

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A nuclear weapons test was conducted successfully Saturday in a tunnel 1,030 feet beneath the surface of Rainier Mesa at the Nevada Test Site, the Department of Energy said.

The 9 a.m. blast, code-named Mission Ghost, was a weapons-effect test with a yield of less than 20 kilotons, department spokesman Jim Boyer said.

It was the eighth nuclear test in Nevada announced this year

and brought to 667 the number of announced nuclear tests at the site since the program began there in 1951, Boyer said.

Reagan slams plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan lashed out Saturday against a \$1 trillion spending plan proposed by congressional Democrats, saying the budget "is as bad as they come."

Among other things, the budget would raise taxes by \$64.3 billion in a three-year period, allow a modest increase in defense spending but increase spending on an array of domestic programs.

In his weekly radio address to the nation, broadcast from his retreat at Camp David, Md., Reagan declared that the American people need an "Economic Bill of Rights" to protect them against excessive taxes, government spending and overregulation.

Decision protested

NEW YORK (AP) — About 250 people protesting what they called light treatment for Bernhard Goetz marched Saturday on the apartment building where the subway gunman entered his fifth day of seclusion.

The 39-year-old electronics technician was cleared last week of all but a weapons possession charge in the shooting of four black teenagers on a subway train on Dec. 22, 1984.

The demonstrators, calling themselves the June 20th Coalition Against Racist Violence, said Goetz was acquitted because he was white.

Sanctions favored

PORTLAND (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to South Africa, appearing to break with Reagan administration policy, applauded American sanctions against the racially segregated nation and said he wouldn't discourage companies from leaving it.

In his first public speech in the United States since becoming ambassador, Edward Perkins said on Friday the sanctions had been "an unmitigated success" in expressing contempt for apartheid.

Coolers exempted

SALEM (AP) — The Senate yielded to the House on Saturday and gave up on putting wine cooler bottles under the state's mandatory deposit law for beverage containers.

The Senate passed a bill earlier in the legislative session to include wine coolers in the deposit law, which now covers beer and soda pop bottles and cans.

But the House approved a revised version of Senate Bill 508 that requires only a study of the impact of wine coolers on the total litter problem.

Senate foes of the changed bill on Saturday tried to send it to a joint negotiating committee to discuss possible compromises, but the move lost 16-14. The House-passed bill then was approved in an 18-12 vote.

DUII bill approved

SALEM (AP) — A bill designed to further crack down on drunken drivers was approved Saturday by the Oregon House despite arguments it would hit hardest at people in rural areas.

The drunken driving measure, Senate Bill 636, would increase the amount of time violators have to wait before they can get an occupational license allowing them to drive to and from work.

Under the bill, first-time DUII violators would have to wait 30 days after flunking a breath test before they could get an occupational license. For second-time offenders, the wait would increase from the current 90 days to a full year.

Occupational permits are issued only if a convicted drunken driver can prove there's no other way to get to work.

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
