

CIE receives funds, expects growth

The Incidental Fee Committee on Tuesday unanimously voted to fund the Computer Information Exchange through October.

The committee allocated \$2,390 from the IFC's surplus account to pay for CIE's computing center, rent and printing charges. In October, the group will request further funding for the rest of the year from the IFC's general fund.

Steve VanDevender, the CIE internal director, told the committee the computer conferencing organization was expecting growth next year and hoped to have 1,000 users registered on the system.

"More people are willing to

say things in that situation than in personal interaction," VanDevender said, adding students and professors have been able to have conversations that would not have occurred in the classroom.

"We're getting people (on the system) who were afraid of computers and didn't know they could be used this way," he said.

The system allows people to talk to other members through the computer on a variety of topics, ranging from housing and jobs to women's studies. There is no cost to students, and all that is required for membership is filling out a form available in the computing

center, said Co-Director Andrew Peterson.

CIE was developed by the Oregon Computing Association and was funded on a trial basis in February by the previous IFC, VanDevender said. Since then the group has developed an organizational structure and has experienced "pretty typical growth for a system of this type," he added.

The committee then dealt with some internal business and set the meeting time to hear a \$30,000 request from the EMU Computer Lounge from the IFC overrealized account.

The computer lounge originally requested \$50,000 for new equipment.

Eugene kicks off its annual series of free "Summer Concerts in the Parks" tonight with a three-band bash at the Amazon Village Community Center beginning at 6 p.m.

There will be three concerts and an ice cream social held at Petersen Barn, beginning with the nostalgic pop and rock sounds of Riffle July 19. The Petersen Barn series runs through August 9, and all shows begin at 6 p.m.
