Area group wants Reagan out

The continuing investigation into the Iran-Contra affair precipitated the formation of a local citizens' group that supports a resolution calling for the impeachment of President Reagan.

The organization, Restore Integrity to National Government (RING), held its first meeting in late June to inform Lane County citizens of House Resolution 111, introduced by Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas.

The Texas congressman is the lone sponsor of the resolution, which favors "impeaching Ronald W. Reagan, President of the United States, of high crimes and misdemeanors," according to the March 5, 1987 Congressional Record. The resolution was referred to the House Judiciary Committee where it has been held without action.

RING representative Ralph Penunuri expressed his concern about an administration that has "openly defied Congress, the Constitution and international law" in a press conference held July 9 at Eugene City Hall.

"The Reagan administration has become the very kind of government our Constitution was made to protect us from," Penunuri said.

One RING member believes the administration's shortcomings are symptomatic of a pervasive national affliction.

"Iran-Contra is a small cancer on the nose of the president," said RING representative Constance Brown, who described the apathy of the American electorate as "the main body cancer." She believes people are more interested in the personalities testifying before the

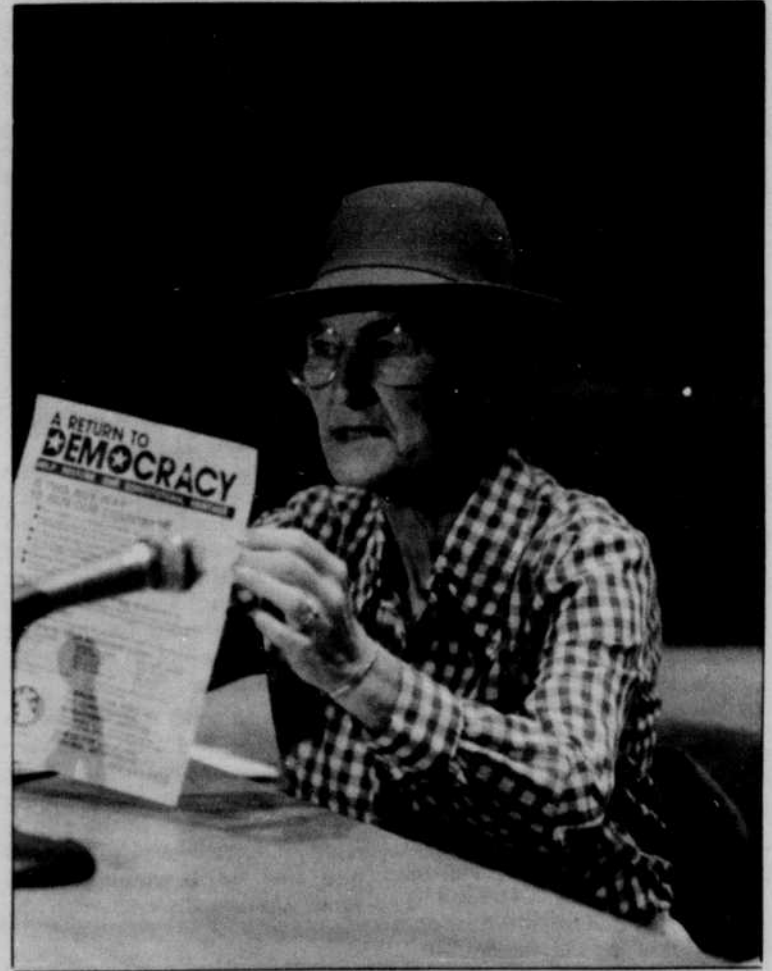

Joint Congressional Committee than the issues surrounding the affair, she said.

"If we don't do something now, secret wars will continue to be waged from the White House basement," Brown said.

An information campaign consisting of meetings, fliers and "Impeach Reagan" bumper stickers comprise RING's

strategy to persuade constituents to urge Oregon legislators in Washington to initiate and support the impeachment process.

RING will hold its next meeting tonight at 7:30 in the Growers Market, located at 454 Willamette St. Interested individuals can contact RING by phoning 683-7233.

Council to throw annual fiesta

The Council for Human Rights in Latin America will be attempting to raise money for the transport of humanitarian aid to Nicaragua when it hosts its annual Nicaragua Friendship Day fiesta July 16 at 5 p.m. in the Lamb Cottage at Skinner Butte Park.

The council hopes to raise \$5,000 from the event, said joint project coordinator Robert Guitteau. "Last year's festival let us ship \$75,000 worth of medical supplies," Guitteau said.

"Because of U.S. trade embargoes, there is a premium on shipping costs to Nicaragua," Guitteau said. "Without the fiesta's financial support,

these supplies would not have reached women or children's hospitals throughout Nicaragua." U.S. embargoes, the Contra war, and a serious drought have increased hardships in Nicaragua, he added.

The council is researching the possibility of sending a barge of Pacific Northwest wheat to Nicaragua, according to Guitteau. "We would like to send 20,000 tons (of wheat). We're not sure...that's what we'll be able to do," he said.

Non-perishable goods such as powdered milk and nuts will also be sent if sufficient funds are raised, Guitteau said.

"It would take \$3,000 just to send medical supplies," Guitteau said. Medical supplies

would include "hospital goods such as bedsheets, I.V.s, gloves and incubators," Guitteau said. He added that they were "very much needed and not wasted."

In addition, Leona Huper, the consul general of the Nicaraguan embassy, will be speaking at the event.

There is no admission charge, but "we are encouraging people to donate towards a commemorative button available for \$3," Guitteau said. "Latin American food will be available for sale on an item-by-item basis. There will also be food sold by various Saturday Market vendors. In addition to the money raised by the sale of the buttons, a raffle will be held.
