# Firm conducts library site study

Four downtown-area sites are under consideration as the location for a new Eugene Public Library, according to a site study released by the architectural firm of Robertson/Sherwood.

One of the locations under consideration is the present library at 100 W. 13th Ave. If that site is chosen, the building would be expanded and a parking garage built across the street.

The other sites under consideration are a city-owned parking lot on Eighth Avenue between Willamette and Olive streets, a city-owned parking lot on Broadway Avenue between Charnelton and Lincoln streets, and a half-block on Olive Street between 10th and 11th avenues.

According to the firm's study, the site on Eighth Avenue between Willamette and Olive streets would cost between \$3 and \$6 million less than the other locations, with an estimated price tag of \$18.8 million. Savings would come from using the Arcade parking garage across the street. All the other sites would require the construction of new parking garages.

Expanding the present library

would cost \$21.7 million, the firm's study stated. The Broadway site would cost \$24.5 million and the Olive Street site would cost \$24.8 million.

Assistant Librarian Carol Hildebrand said Wednesday that it would be easier to move to a new location than to expand the present library.

"This building has asbestos in the ceilings on two floors," Hildebrand said. "That has to be removed and that is a very expensive, troublesome and time-consuming project that I'm sure would require that we move out entirely for two or three months while it is being done."

"The other thing is that we can't put any collection on the top floor. We don't have any books up there because they didn't build the top floor strong enough to do that," she said.

The study estimated it would cost \$600,000 to remove the asbestos ceiling material.

The Robertson/Sherwood site study will be presented to the Future of Our Library Committee today. The committee will receive input from the public at meetings scheduled July 28 and August 20, and then will make a recommendation on size, location, building design requirements and financing to the

Eugene City Council. A bond election is expected sometime in 1988.

"We will undoubtedly need to go to the community for support for the funding. The city does not have the money to build a building now. They took from existing revenues to help with the airport. They can't do that again," Hildebrand said.

If voters approve funding for a new library, the building would probably not be open to the public until mid-1990, Hildebrand said.

The site study was completed after the City Council adopted a committee report last December. The report called for the expansion to a two- to four-story building with 90,000 to 120,000 square feet and implementation of a branch library system within five years of construction of a new library. The present library has 37,000 square feet.

The present library was built in 1959. Since that time Eugene's population has grown from 50,000 to 106,000. According to the committee's report, the library is the second most used city facility behind Mahlon Sweet Airport. About 400,000 visits are made to the library by users each year.
