**Seduction lawsuit**

A former patient of a Eugene alcohol treatment center filed suit in August against a University student for allegedly seducing her while she was undergoing treatment at the center.

C.L. Dundas claims in the suit that she became involved in a sexual relationship with Jed Reay, a University student and former Serenity Lane counselor, at a time when she was vulnerable due to her withdrawal from alcohol.

The suit claims Reay used his position as a counselor at Serenity Lane to seduce Dundas and to influence her to keep the relationship quiet.

Reay received a bachelor's degree in psychology from the University last winter, and has been accepted as a graduate student for fall term in the speech, rhetoric and communication department.

He also served as a paraprofessional adviser in the University's Office of Academic Advising and Student Services during the fall of 1986 and the winter of 1987.

Named as defendants in the \$2.6 million suit filed August 6 in Lane County Circuit Court are Reay, Serenity Lane Executive Director Neil McNaughton, director of counseling Joe Steiner Sr. and five counselors.

Serenity Lane is accused of failing to screen, test, instruct and supervise its employees and of failing to prevent its patients from having relationships

with employees. The counselors are accused of knowing about the relationship but making no attempt to intervene.

**Dead Concert**

A Eugene city ordinance



police estimated 500,000 fans attended the show.

Eugene police assigned 15 extra officers to the residential and commercial areas near Autzen Stadium prior to and after the concert.

They later reported no major problems, although a handful of drug arrests were made.

**Extradiction**

A former University child care worker accused of sexually abusing three young girls was

extradited back to Oregon after being caught attempting to flee the United States.

Brian Sydney Smith was stopped at London's Heathrow Airport on July 27 after customs agents found Lane County documents pertaining to court dates in his luggage.

Smith is a former employee of the University Child Care and Development Center. He also is the former director of a children's program at a local elementary school and a former

employee of Eugene Latch Key Inc., an after school program.

According to an assistant Lane County district attorney, none of the alleged sexual abuses occurred at places of employment.

Smith was arrested in December, 1986 and charged with multiple counts of first-degree sodomy, sexual abuse and attempted rape allegedly involving three girls ages 12 and under.


