Audience can expect 'exciting' show when Simply Red plays Hult Center

When Simply Red brings its show to Eugene's Hult Center for the Performing Arts on Sunday night, the band brings the experience of almost seven months of touring and a performance drummer Chris Joyce describes as "exciting" and "dynamic."

The band is touring in support of its "Men and Women" LP, the follow-up to "Picture Book." The debut album, which spawned "Money's Too Tight (to Mention)" and the number one smash "Holding Back the Years," has nearly gone platinum with the follow up approaching gold.

"We're influenced by R & B, but we're also influenced by soul and reggae and jazz. And we tie all those elements together within a show, and it comes out fairly interesting," Joyce said, speaking from his hotel in Calgary, Alberta where the band was performing earlier this week. "I don't know if you've ever seen a James Brown show, you know there are some bits with everyone blasting out — all the band — and then all the sudden it just drops down to nothing. We can do things like that. We've learned the art of dynamics on stage."

This is the band's second world tour, which will end in England in late December. The

major difference in this tour from the previous one is the absence of Sylvan Richardson, the band's guitarist. That loss hasn't been detrimental to the band however, Joyce said.

"We've improved immensely because we've got a guitar player (Iziz Ibrahim) in who's really enjoying himself. And he fits in really well with the band, he enjoys going on stage which is something Sylvan wasn't all that enamored by. Sylvan had like an internal battle going on with himself, really. He's more into jazz fusion, and I think he would be happier playing another kind of music that the music Simply Red does."

Mick Hucknall, the lead singer with the cascading red hair, is the principal songwriter and mouthpiece of the band and that is the role the band is comfortable with, Joyce said. It's not difficult to be in a band where there is one member who receives all the attention, he said.

"When we formed the band, we set it up to be that way because if you have a successful band, it's pretty obvious the media are going to want to talk to the lead singer or the main songwriter. So when we made the records, like with the covers of "Picture Book" and "Men and Women," we stuck Mick's face on the front because it's easier for people — the general public to recognize one person than have like six people

plastered across the cover that nobody's quite sure who's the singer or what anybody's doing in the band. It's just an easier way to market the band for us. Behind the scenes, it's very much a band."

Hucknall has earned a reputation in the press as being stubborn and even domineering. Contrary to what some journalists have written about the man, Joyce said he is not that difficult to work with.

"I think what happens is sometimes in certain interviews — we're from Manchester in the north of England and people have a pretty dry sense of humor there. They're being funny but they're not smiling sometimes. And it gets interpreted in the wrong way."

On the two albums there is only one "band track." "Won't Feel Bad" from "Men and Women," Joyce said there may be more band tracks on the next album (scheduled to go into production in early summer 1988), but the band is comfortable with Hucknall's writing.

"Mick writes good songs. If he wrote crap songs, we'd be unhappy. But he doesn't write crap songs," Joyce said.

Joyce predicts the third album will be made as a reaction to the two previous records much in the same way "Men and Women" was a reaction to "Picture Book," he said. Before starting the second LP, the band took a look at what it didn't like

about "Picture Book" and reacted against it, Joyce said.

"When we first recorded 'Picture Book,' we'd only done four or five live shows as a group. So we were quite inexperienced playing live, when we went into record 'Picture Book.'" From there the band spent the next 18 months on the road and then went back into the studio to record the follow-up.

Joyce believes the individual band members played better "instrumental-wise" on "Men and Women" than on "Picture Book," he said. However on "Men and Women," Joyce said the band may have gone for too hard an approach on some of the songs.

"We felt the production on 'Picture Book' was quite keyboard oriented. We wanted to get more guitar on 'Men and Women' and a bit more brass and bring the backing vocals out a bit more because a lot of those things got buried on the first album," he said.

Simply Red's success has certainly changed the lives of the band members. Two and a half years ago, most of them were on British Social Security. And although "Men and Women" hasn't yet duplicated the success of "Picture Book," Joyce is optimistic. "It's still early days for 'Men and Women,'" he said. The record has been out since March and the band has only been able to tour America now, Joyce said.

Zero plays 'highly improvisational' combination of rock, jazz material

If Zero's music confuses you, then don't be surprised. It's suppose to. At least, it is according to Banana.

"We like to call the kind of music we play rock-jazz-confusion," said Banana (real name Lowell Levinger) in a telephone interview from San Francisco. "It's mostly instrumental and highly improvisational. It's confusing on-

ly in that it's not easily definable."

Banana, a veteran of the music business and a former member of The Youngbloods, will be appearing with Zero when they play the WOW Hall, 9:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday. Although he's been with the group only a short time, he's thoroughly versed in the band's history and style.

"Our two greatest influences are the two leaders of the band, Greg Anton and Steve Kimock," said Banana. "Greg is our pragmatic leader, and Steve

is our musical leader. Most of our material comes from the two of them. They both have written most of our original songs."

The titles of Zero's songs are provocative: "Tear Tags Off Mattresses," "Rigor Mortis," and "STD (Severe Tire Damage)." In addition to those original instrumental tunes, Zero plays a couple of original songs with vocals.

Banana said Zero will cover some classic rhythm and blues songs too, and two of them, "Baby, Baby" and "Try a Little Tenderness" feature brilliant solos from Martin Fiero on sax.

Like Banana, the other members of Zero are seasoned Bay area musicians. Kimock (a former member of Kingfish (as is Bobby Vega, the bass player) and The Goodman Brothers. And guitarist John Cipollina formerly played with Dinosaurs, Problem Child, and Quicksilver Messenger Service.

Doors to the WOW Hall open at 9 pm both Friday and Saturday. Tickets are \$6 at the door. On Saturday only, the WOW Hall is welcoming back University students with a \$1 discount upon presentation of valid student ID.
