

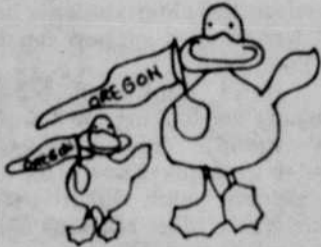
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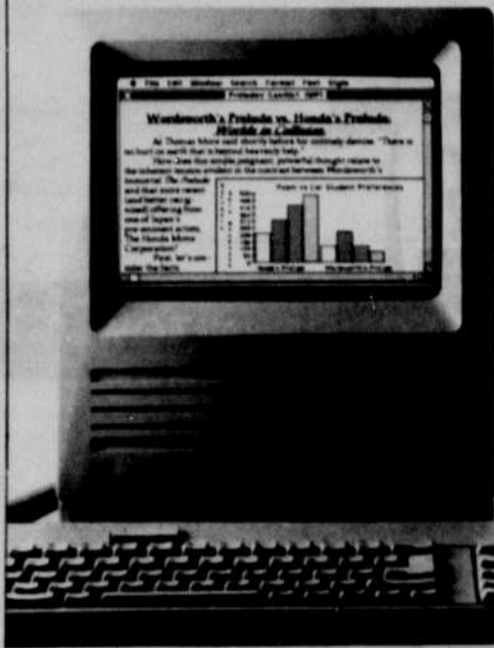

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Reinmuth to serve as temporary provost

James Reinmuth, dean of the College of Business Administration, has agreed to serve as acting provost when the position is vacated on Jan. 15 by current provost Richard Hill.

The decision by Reinmuth was announced on Tuesday by University President Paul Olum. Hill announced his retirement from the administrative position last winter.

"My primary objective will be to continue to hire outstanding faculty, and keep the ones we currently have," Reinmuth said.

Reinmuth will serve as provost until June 30, 1988, while a national search for a new provost is conducted. Reinmuth is not a candidate for the provost position.

"The president and the deans asked me to do it, and I'm pleased to help," Reinmuth said. "I've been around here for 21 years, and I guess I'm sort of a company man."

"Reinmuth has been on the faculty of the University for 20 years and he knows every part of this institution extremely well," Olum said. "He is held

in very high regard by his colleagues in the business school and in the faculty generally."

After joining the faculty of the College of Business Administration in 1967, Reinmuth quickly earned a reputation as a leader in research on business planning, forecasting and analysis. In 1967, he was named dean of the College of Business Administration.

Reinmuth has written and published six books and more than 40 articles and frequently serves as a seminar leader in management training workshops directed to strategic planning, forecasting, market

planning and leadership.

He has successfully combined his academic interests with an active role in the Oregon business community. Reinmuth is a partner in an individual and corporate investment planning firm, a partner in a management consulting, business planning and capital acquisition service, and is co-owner of a sawmill equipment manufacturer.

Reinmuth currently serves as a member of the Eugene Water and Electric Board, and he is a director of the Oregon Pacific Economic Development Corporation.

Gleason added.

City Councilor Freeman Holmer cautioned about being too optimistic and said although the plan has been quite successful in the last 20 years, it may not be the best plan for the coming years.

Perhaps the most controversial aspect of the council's downtown plan is the proposed reopening of Willamette Street between Eighth and 10th Avenues, which is the heart of the downtown mall. The council will meet Oct. 28 to discuss that issue.

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
