# Volleyball takes win streak north

Duck hunting season officially begins on Oct. 17, but it's

already open season on the Ducks' volleyball team following their upset wins over nationally-ranked UCLA and USC last weekend.

Following their successful two-match homestand against the Bruins and Trojans, the Ducks take to the road this week, traveling to Washington to battle the Huskies on Friday, then making the trek across state to play Washington State in Pullman on Saturday.

Even before the release of the women's collegiate volleyball polls on Tuesday, Oregon head

coach Gerry Gregory commented, "everybody's going to be shooting for us now."

The most recent NCAA and Tachikara Volleyball Coaches poll both had the Ducks ranked 12th in the nation (up from 15th and 18th, respectively), their highest ranking ever during a season. Volleyball Monthly placed Oregon 10th in its pre-season poll.

Oregon's win over the Trojans on Sunday vaulted the Ducks into first place in the Pacific-10 Conference with a 4-0 record (7-3 overall). Stanford and UCLA are both hanging on the Ducks' tails with 3-1 records.

With first place however, comes a big burden for the Ducks to carry if they are to remain on top of the Pac-10 for the rest of the season.

Gregory expects it to be tougher to stay atop the conference than it was to get there. He said Oregon cannot afford to let down against anyone, because every team will be saving their best for the first-place Ducks.

"It's going to be a challenge. There are not many weaknesses in the Pac-10. There's a lot of quality teams, and it's going to be tough physically and mentally to stay in first place," Gregory said.

The Ducks are obviously go-

ing to have their hands full, but Oregon players have made it known that they are not going to make things easy for their opponents.

Oregon sophomore Stephanie Drier said following the Bruins' game, "we used to get fired up for teams like UCLA, but now those teams are going to have to start playing at our level, and not us at theirs."

Outside hitter Michele Krebsbach added: "They (UCLA) might have come here expecting us to roll over for them, but we weren't going to."

Besides the Ducks' jump to 12th in the national polls, other off-the-court news this week saw Oregon's Teri Kramer picking up her second Pac-10 player of the week award in three weeks.

Junior middle blocker Lauri Krejcha increased her blocks per game average to 1.8, good enough to place her seventh in the nation; and setter Tina Adolph ranks 19th in assists with 11.0 per game as the only other Duck among national leaders.

Oregon's first opponent this weekend, Washington, is one of the "quality teams" that Gregory spoke of.

The Huskies finished 22-13 overall in 1986, and 10-8 in the Pac-10, two games behind the fourth-place Ducks.

Lindy Vivas steps into her fourth year as head coach at Washington with a 53-47 career mark, and has the Huskies 13-3 overall this season, 1-2 in conference play.

Statistically, Washington owns the 16th best team hitting percentage in the country at .257.

The Huskies also have history on their side. They swept both matches with the Ducks last year and lead the all-time series, 15-11.

The Cougars, meanwhile, had their problems last year. Washington State finished eighth in the Pac-10 with a 3-15 conference record, 13-22 overall.

Despite their current 0-3 record in the Pac-10, the Cougs rank 10th in the nation in kill average, recording 15.3 per game. Freshman outside hitter Susan Guest is second in the Pac-10 with a 3.76 kills-per-game average.

Approximately 800 student tickets remain for Saturday's Pacific-10 Conference football game between Oregon and the University of Washington, the Athletic Department reported Wednesday.

The Athletic Department made the decision earlier this week to hold all student tickets for the game, and those tickets will not be offered as general admission seats, as was earlier reported.

"This is a student activity, and we want as many there as possible," said ticket manager Hunt Holsapple.

Students may pick up their free tickets at Mac Court upon presentation of photo

I.D. and current fee card. To obtain spouse or spousal equivalent tickets, proper certification from the ASUO will also be necessary.

To ensure students with free tickets get into the game, they should bring both their University-photo I.D. cards and their fee cards for the current term, the Athletic Department recommends.

Students will be asked to produce one or both documents, in addition to their tickets, to gain admittance.

Approximately 2,000 reserved tickets were also still available for the game at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday.
