studies, inter-university graduate and research programs, as well as university-industry relations in the United States.

One of their main goals is to secure a loan from World Bank to fund improvements in natural sciences and engineering in Chinese graduate programs. Details have yet to be determined.

Delegates conceded that education is lacking in China. "Education is always related to the economy," said Wang Yigui, provost of Beijing University.

Noting that the Chinese economy is less advanced than those of Western countries, he said, "Right now we're developing the economy, so we also have to make our education more advanced."

When first asked why the delegation chose to visit the University, Wang and Wu Benxia laughed. Wang then said that the state of Oregon emphasizes development of education.

"Your system is an example for China," he said. Wu, chief of the delegation, is director of the department of graduate education for the State Education Commission. Wu also recently led a similar group of educators to Europe.

The delegation arrived in Seattle earlier in the week to tour the University of Washington. Today the group visits Oregon State University. Saturday they fly east to tour Harvard College, Cornell University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The delegation also will visit The National Academy of Sciences and other academic and scientific foundations. They will return to China in mid-October.

The delegation met Thursday morning with heads from various departments of the College of Arts and Sciences, followed by lunch among the Ming vases, silk tapestries and Imperial Chinese robes of the Museum of Art.

After lunch, Moseley gave an overview of scientific research at the University. The delegation then heard presentations from University scientists and visited five different research labs. Oregon State System of Higher Education Chancellor William Davis hosted a dinner Thursday night.

Moseley pointed out that there are a number of Chinese students at the University, which may have made it "more attractive" for the delegation.

Wang suggested that closer ties between the University and the Chinese State Education Committee — and the possibility of an exchange program — might arise out of the visit. "We look forward to establishing closer ties between the Chinese

universities and the University of Oregon," he said.

Members of the delegation, in addition to Wang and Wu, are: Guo Zhengyuan, vice dean of graduate engineering for Tsinghua University; Wu Zhenrou, chief of the graduate aerodynamics department of the State Education Commission; and Chen Qinglong, chief of the biology department of the State Education Commission.

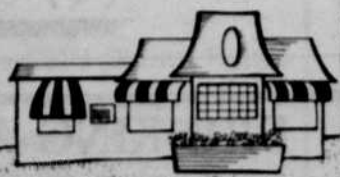
