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OSPIRG attacks many concerns

The Oregon Student Public Interest Group is working to reduce toxic waste production in the state as its major campaign for the year.

The first part of that campaign started last week at the ASUO-sponsored Street Faire on 13th Avenue when members of OSPIRG gathered more than 1,200 signed "clean stamps" from students and community members, said Lisa Horowitz, the OSPIRG University campus coordinator. The campus chapter's goal is to collect 2,000 stamps, Horowitz added.

Public interest research groups statewide are working to gather 20,000 clean stamps to present to Gov. Neil Goldschmidt in support of the Toxic Use Reduction Act, Horowitz said. The act would encourage industry to substitute non-toxic chemicals for toxic chemicals for production purposes, Horowitz said.

"What (the stamps) say is Oregonians are concerned about toxic waste," she said.

OSPIRG is also working on four other projects: toy safety, a recycling drive, the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and the continuation of the consumer hotline, Horowitz said.

Right now, the University chapter is in the process of recruiting new members for the upcoming year, Horowitz added. There is a general interest meeting tonight at 7 in EMU Cedar Room F.

"We're expecting about 75 people to attend the general interest meeting," Horowitz said. About one half of those will eventually get involved in the chapter, she added.

"Students have a lot to gain from getting involved in OSPIRG," Horowitz said.

Once the recruitment drive is completed, OSPIRG will continue planning for a World Food Day Teleconference on Oct. 16. Horowitz said the group is

working with Clergy and Laity Concerned and Food for Lane County in conjunction with the Student Campaign Against Hunger to bring a teleconference panel discussion from Washington, D.C., to the University.

The topic of discussion is "Poverty, Hunger and Interdependence." After the first hour, the satellite will be turned off and conversation will focus on hunger in Lane County, Horowitz said. For the third hour, views will be able to call in questions to the panel members.

OSPIRG was formed 1971 at the University and has since served as the model for other similar groups across the nation. In addition to the University chapter, there are currently chapters at Portland State University, Lewis and Clark College and one in the organizational stages at Southern Oregon State College. Nationwide there are 26 such groups in operation.

membership but will also help increase the number of computer-literate students at the University."

Ames, a graduate student in linguistics, added that although some of the members and assistants on CIE were alumni and faculty members, the

organization is essentially run by students.

Organizers feel that this helps develop a better relationship between faculty and students because it allows the students to meet faculty members in a different, less stressful atmosphere and allows faculty members the chance to view the opinions of their students on various topics.

Access to CIE is less of an obstacle than many people think it may be. There are presently terminals in almost every dormitory recreation room, the EMU Computer Lounge, the University Computing Center, the Chiles Center and most other departments on campus that are linked with the main system, added Ames. No fee is charged for using these terminals for access onto CIE.

Publicity plays a very important role in the organization of CIE. Each term, the organizers think of projects by which they can inform more people about what CIE is and what it has to

offer.

"We are planning a membership drive on October 28 at the University Bookstore," said Robert Powell, CIE's publicity director. "There are also six other projects in the making which may be implemented soon."

Powell plans to have terminals available at the table in the bookstore to demonstrate that one does not have to be computer literate to begin using CIE.

"CIE can really help students in both their scholastic and personal lives," said Linda Fernandes, administrative director for CIE. "And the best way for a person to overcome computer phobia is to join CIE."
