Enter Irv and Joe Simpson. The brothers, who weren't really sure of their class standing or even their majors, said they have undergone severe depression since the players went on strike.

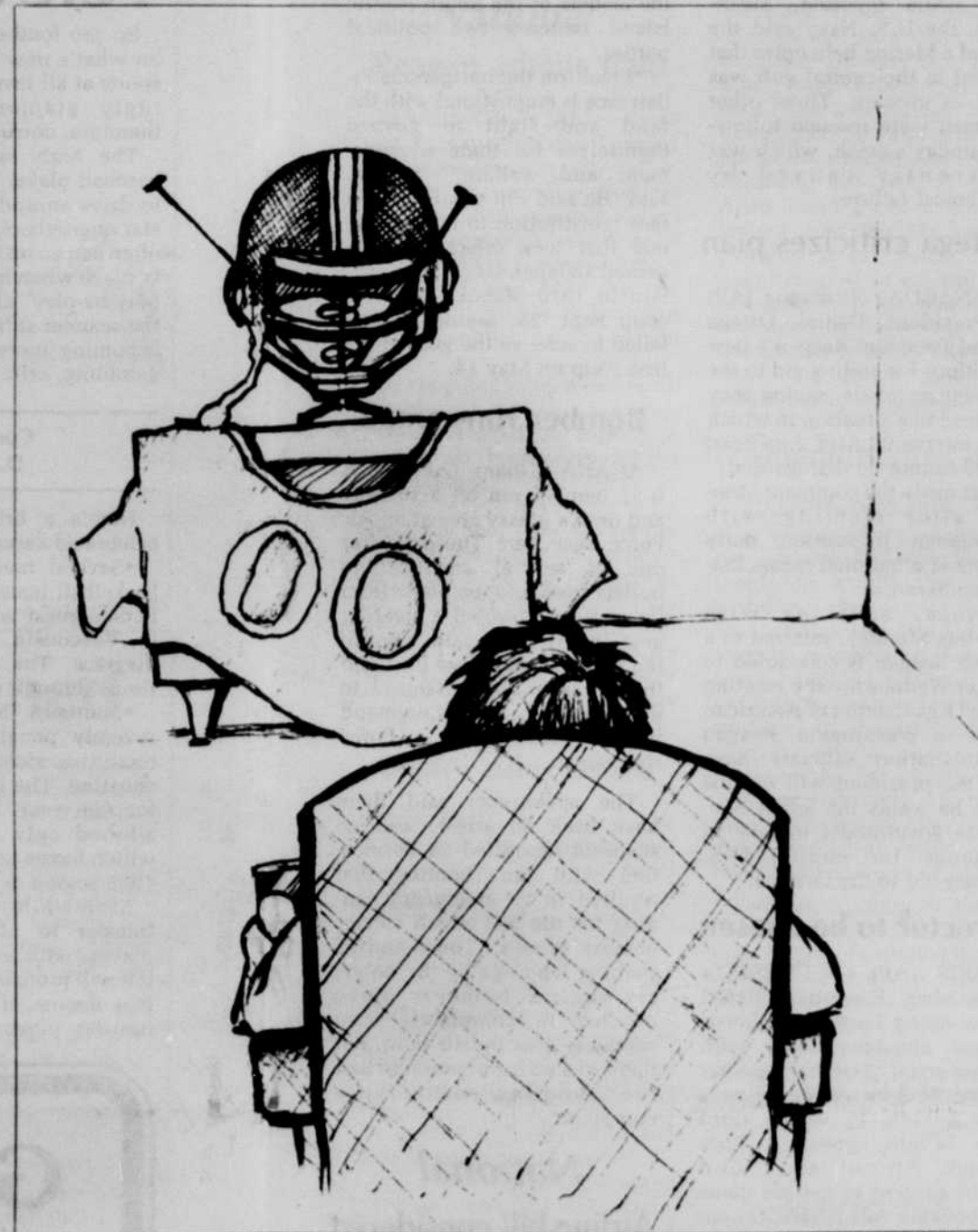
"The games Sunday were just a big joke," said Irv. "That wasn't football. I watched the games for a few minutes until it made me sick. My high school team played better."
