meeting without the knowledge of the full committee and deciding who will hold the position violated sections 2.3 and 6.5 of the ASUO Constitution and Oregon Revised Statutes sections 192.610 to 192.690.

Section 2.3 of the constitution provides that no agency of the ASUO shall take any action that abridges the privileges and immunities of any person under Oregon State law. Section 6.5 provides that all meetings are open to the public and must be announced in the Oregon Daily Emerald at least 24 hours in advance. The ORS citation refers to the Oregon Public Meetings Law.

Baldwin, who cited Hoyt as the opponent in the case, said he is seeking a court opinion to set an official precedent against such actions.

"I believe a strong central operation within the party is proper. But four people getting together and deciding they can run everything" is not what SPA stands for, Baldwin said.

"I oppose the concept of shut-

ting them (Thompson and Leahy) out completely," he said.

As for his own involvement in the discussion, Baldwin said he was concerned at first about the informal gathering. But once discussion started, he was as involved as the other participants, he said.

"I can't excuse my own participation," Baldwin said. "I could or should have tried to stop it" when discussion shifted to the officer elections, but by that time, he was as involved as the other participants, he said.

Baldwin, who has publicly acknowledged his desire to continue as IFC chairman, is also sending a copy of his brief to Peter Swan, University President Paul Olum's legal adviser. This is because he is not sure how much weight a Constitution Court finding has with this committee or future committees, he said.

When informed of last Friday's private meeting, Thompson expressed disappointment that a decision was made without knowledge of the full

board.

"I'm disappointed because it precludes our concern about who we would like as chair. Not that we would necessarily disagree, but that it's an effort to preclude us," Thompson said.

Hoyt could not be reached for comment.

the old system because students lined up at the department before the doors opened — sometimes days before — and any student who could not wait in line would not have a chance at any openings, said Frank Gaddini, area director of Amazon and East Campus family housing.

He agreed changes need to be made in the system; although he's not ready to give up on the lottery. "But, I think it's important to follow student recommendations," he added.

Lis Perlman, a graduate architecture student and two-year

East Campus resident, had collaborated with East Campus residents and devised a first-come, first-serve waiting list system. However, it requires students to confirm their spot on the list every term instead of beginning each term with a new list.

This system will eliminate the lines each term and assure each family its spot so they don't get their hopes up each term, she said.

"I agree with the waiting system. I think it would be a fairer idea than the lottery,"

said Geoff Brooks, a graduate teaching fellow in the business school.

"At today's meeting it seemed that the tendency was to go back to the old system, but with modifications to that system that meet today's environment," Gaddini said.

He said the next meeting probably will produce a written proposal, which would be submitted to the housing department's administrative staff for ratification. The next meeting will be held in two weeks, but he gave no specific date.

owned so the land would require purchasing. The city has talked to the owners but no price has been set yet," Tamulonis said.

Currently the depot is in fair condition, Tamulonis said. "Deterioration is setting in, though, in some areas. The exterior needs substantial repairs and painting," he said.

According to Murdock, the building is a city landmark, a state landmark and is eligible to be listed on the National Historic Register.

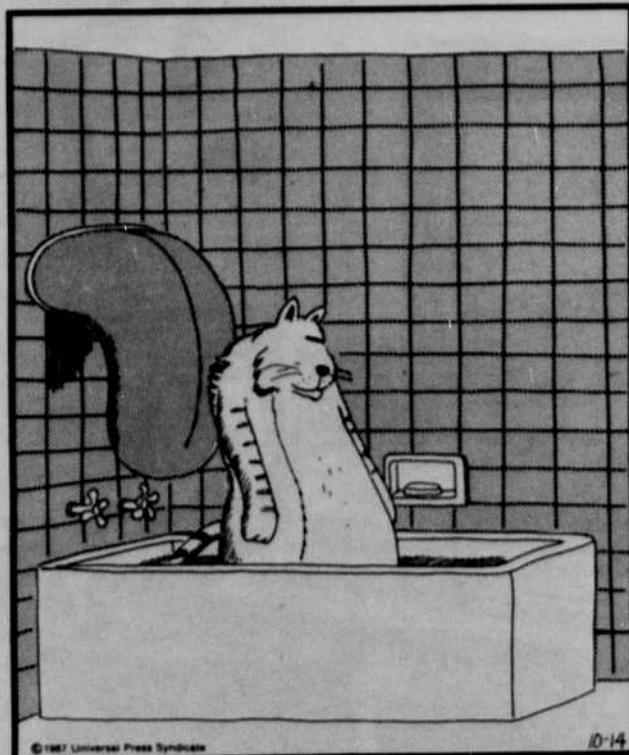
Murdock cited possible uses for the depot as a tourist information center, a small perform-

ing arts center or a Willamalane Parks District building. She said the city should reach a decision as to what it will do with the station by the end of this year.

If enough funding cannot be

located, Southern Pacific has the ultimate decision as to what to do with it. Tamulonis said that if the city doesn't take it, the railroad company will probably tear it down.

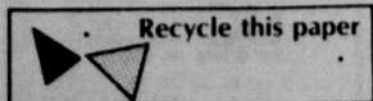
