The University Senate met for the first time this year Wednesday and passed a provision recommending the State Board of Higher Education change its current search process for new presidents.

Senate calls for new search process

The University Senate met Wednesday Oct. 14 and passed a resolution recommending a revision in the State Board of Higher Education's presidential search process.

Faculty across the state are concerned about the lack of faculty involvement in the process, said Kappy Eaton, the University's representative for the Association of

Oregon Faculty and a University professor emeritus.

The board's current process calls for a nine-person search committee that includes three faculty members from the campus being affected, Eaton said.

"We would increase that number on the search committee to 15 with seven faculty members from the campus that is searching (for a president)," she said of the recommended revision, which will now be sent to the state board.

Other recommendations include establishing campus committees that would have an opportunity to meet with presidential finalists. Currently, finalists can be appointed without visiting the campus, she said.

During the 90-minute session, the Senate also voiced concerns about the state board's academic calendar for the University's convergence to the semester system, which will go into effect during the 1990-91 school year.
