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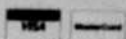
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Police Beat

The following is a list of campus area crimes that occurred between Oct. 8 and Oct. 15.

•A man punched a private security guard in the face at Autzen Stadium before the Oregon/USC game on Oct. 10. The security guard was explaining to a person why that person could not bring a football into the stadium when a man intervened into the discussion.

The man then asked the security guard to take his glasses off so he could hit him, and struck the guard in the mouth. The guard defended himself by taking the man to the ground. A Eugene Police officer saw the struggle and assisted the guard in subduing the man. The guard then placed the man under citizen's arrest for assault, and the EPD officer lodged the man in the Lane County Jail.

•Approximately \$600 worth of car-stereo equipment and a book bag was stolen from a car parked on 15th Avenue and Moss Street. The incident was reported to the EPD on Oct. 10.

•Two screen windows were found cut open at Delta Gamma sorority on the morning of Oct. 11. The incident occurred sometime between 12:30 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. There were no missing objects nor any sign of entry. The EPD investigated the incident. There were no suspects.

•A transient was arrested on Oct. 11 and

charged with trespassing on University property and resisting arrest by the EPD. Campus Security had issued the man a warning to stay off the campus on Oct. 10. The man was observed near Condon Hall at 9:12 p.m. A EPD officer took the man into custody after a struggle and lodged the man in the Lane County Jail.

•Two men were issued citations for criminal mischief after they broke down a door and entered an apartment on Oct. 12. The occupant of the apartment, on 1436 Alder, was not there at the time. The EPD responded to a call made by the apartment manager at 2:25 a.m., and found the two suspects in the apartment with items in their arms. One of the suspects explained that his girlfriend lived there, and he was retrieving some things that belonged to him. The officer asked the suspect if he knew the woman's last name, and the suspect answered that he did not. The apartment's owner could not be reached, so the EPD has not been able to verify the suspect's claim. One of the suspects was arrested on an outstanding warrant and lodged in the Lane County Jail.

•Campus Security reported 14 bicycles and two mopeds stolen last week. Both of the mopeds were recovered, along with two bicycles.

Library a sleeper for computer fans

The popularity of microcomputer use has generated a need to learn more about the types of computer programs available to the public.

However, unknown to many, much of this information can be found in the computer-related magazines and books located on the shelves of the University Computing Center's documents room.

According to librarian Betsy Shaw, few people outside the computer science department know of the existence of this resource and remain unaware that the document room's col-

lection also is available to the general public.

"Because we are a specialized library, we can be more flexible in our policies and our circulation services," Shaw said. Services offered by the three-member staff at the Documents Room include the indexing of newsletters from other academic computing centers throughout North America, providing computer-related information to faculty and staff members and storage of computer manuals to help individuals use the Computing Center's two mainframe computing systems.

"Although we're a small independent library and information center, we're very service-oriented," Shaw said. Staff members help students locate general information about the computer software that interests them.

Information about individual programs can be found in a

directory of computer software and hardware, Shaw said. These directories makes it easier for individuals to compare the costs of different programs and to learn more about the program's strengths and weaknesses, she added.

These directories "allow individuals to do some homework," Shaw said. As a result, "it gives the individual a chance to do some comparison shopping before hitting the computer stores or talking with the vendors," she added.

In addition to a series of computer-related documents, the documents room also offers a collection of public-domain software. According to Shaw, these are the type of programs that can be freely copied.

However, the documents room's collection of public-domain software can only be used on either the Apple Macin-

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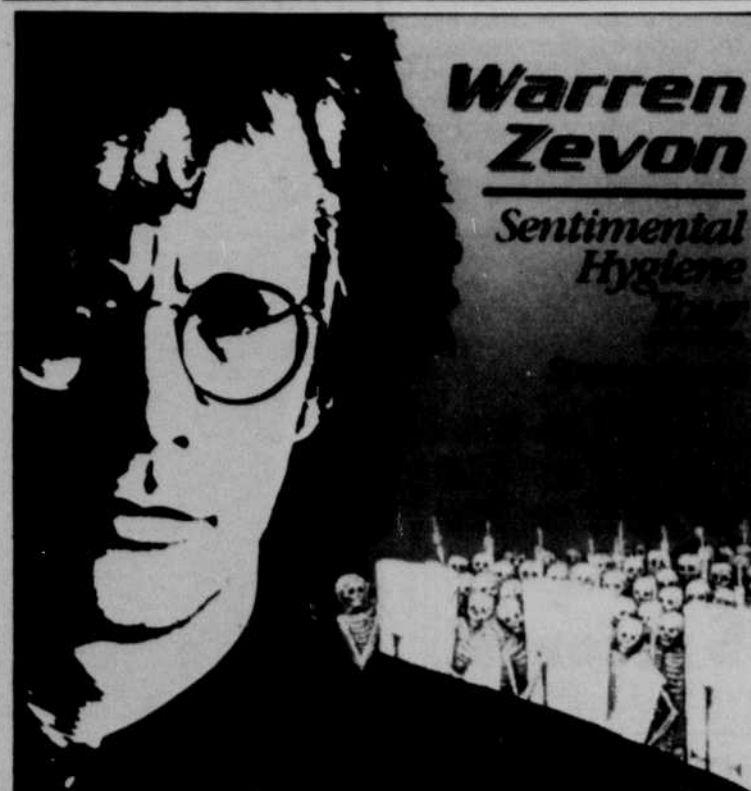
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
