the Ducks trailed 17-7 at the half.

"Their defense was good. We got good field position in the first half and couldn't capitalize. Even though we scored 17 points, we should have gotten a lot more, so they (the Ducks) deserve a lot of credit," said Aikman, who finished with 19 completions and two TDs in 29 attempts.

Fourth-string Bruin defensive end Steve Mehr, who did not make a tackle in the game, was less gracious. "(The Ducks) came out making a lot of noise, but they weren't shit," he boasted.

UCLA began to wear down the Webfoot defense in the third quarter. Brooks said after the game that the smog, which was declared to be at dangerous levels in greater Los Angeles on Saturday, caused nausea and vision problems for some of his players.

Green gained 41 yards in the third stanza on just 5 carries as

the big Bruin line began pushing out the smaller Ducks. Strong safety Anthony Newman led the Ducks in tackles with 11, including nine solo stops. It marked the first time this season that a member of the secondary led the team in tackles.

"We did okay, but we let the offense down. We never got the ball back for them," Newman said, as the Duck defense failed to produce any turnovers for the first time in six games.

UCLA's defense thwarted two long Oregon drives, including one series when Oregon had the ball first and goal at the UCLA five-yard line and had to settle for a 32-yard Kirk Dennis field goal.

The previous drive had ended with a Dennis miss from 41 yards out, which snapped the kicker's string of consecutive field goals at five.

The biggest play of the third period, and possibly the game, came on UCLA's first possession of the second half.

On fourth-and-four from the Oregon 38, UCLA lined up to punt. But the ball was snapped to fullback Mel Farr, who tucked the ball between tackle Randy Austin's legs while the UCLA team decoyed a reverse and Barkate pretended the ball has been snapped over his head.

Oregon's defense lost track of the ball completely as Austin delayed at the line of scrimmage. He then took off up the left sideline, and no Duck was within 15 yards of Austin when he crossed the goal line.

"We lost sight of it. They were doing all sorts of crazy things out there and no one could find the ball until it was too late. They executed the play perfectly," recalled Newman, one of the Ducks victimized on the play.

The "bumeroo" as Donahue called the play, was inserted in UCLA's game plan two weeks ago. "With the ball at the 38 it was as safe as a punt, so we decided to go for it," Donahue said.

Musgrave, number four nationally in passing efficiency going into the game, then threw three incomplete passes, one dropped by Joe Meerten that would have been a first down, and Jan Cespedes shanked a 12-yard punt. Result: UCLA takes over on Oregon's 37 and kicks a field goal with 16 seconds left in the half.

Are you starting to see the picture? Oregon's defense didn't kill the team, the team killed itself.

In fact the defense only gave up 280 total yards, quite a bit less than their 417 average. They also held Heisman Trophy candidate Gaston Green to 39 yards and the team to 15 rushing yards in the first half. What's even more incredible is the Ducks were only down by 10 with four turnovers.

But Oregon went from bad to ugly in the second half and its lucky fortunes ran out.

In the third quarter, the Bruins scored a touchdown on a fake punt that fooled the televi-

sion crews, the 53,320 fans and Oregon's defense. To make matters worse, the Ducks could only muster a Kirk Dennis field goal on two long drives.

The fourth quarter was just as disastrous. Four minutes into the period Musgrave fumbled from a Carnell Lake deflection and the Bruins took over, driving 66 yards to set up Green's touchdown.

The "game" now became a rout.

Oregon kicked more sand in its own face with two interceptions late in the game. The first, a 65-yard touchdown return by Marcus Turner and the second one coming six seconds later when backup quarterback Pete Nelson underthrew his second pass of the season to Bruin cornerback Randy Beverly.

While Oregon's mistakes made UCLA look like a powerhouse, statistically, Oregon didn't play that bad. UCLA only had one more first down and third down conversion and Oregon won the total yardage and passing

departments.

"The score was no indication of the difference between the two football teams. Certainly, UCLA earned what they got, they took the ball away from us and we haven't made those kind of mistakes all year long...but, they did not dominate the game," Brooks said.

Rightly so, it's awfully hard to beat the number nine team in the nation on their home turf when you cough up the ball seven times. Fans should remember that as Oregon will need their support when they prepare for Saturday's game at Stanford. More importantly, if the Ducks should happen to falter in Palo Alto, it will be interesting to see if the 6,000 students, who sucked up all the free tickets for the California game on Oct. 31, come out to support the Ducks.

I doubt Oregon will drop two in a row, especially to the struggling Cardinal, but I do think the bandwagon is going to get a lot lighter because of fair-weather fans.
