together" of different groups targeted by hate groups such as Aryan Nations.

"There was actually very little student participation," Hughes said. "The vast majority of the participants were upper-middle class white heterosexual people."

Hughes said that disabled, gay and feminist issues were largely ignored.

The conference was primarily an information session on the state of racial and religious harassment, Hughes said. "There didn't seem to be any focus on what we should be doing," he said, noting that he

had hoped to learn constructive ideas on how to deal with harassment. "It was a complete waste of time for ASUO groups," he said.

Hughes said the conference initially "looked good on paper" and he appreciated that the ASUO asked GALA to go.

Hughes added that the "narrow scope" of the conference was unfortunate because of the increased harassment towards gays as a result of the AIDS epidemic. "The board of directors seemed pretty insensitive to this," he said.

The GALA office receives "10 to 15 threatening calls every

day," Hughes said.

However, Hintsala did not see the exclusion of other issues as a major shortcoming.

"You choose to be gay or lesbian," Hintsala said. "For a race or religious group, you're visibly of the race that you're going to be discriminated against. Unless you're a highly visible gay or lesbian, you're not that noticable."

Starfire's loggers, after five workdays in September, haven't worked at all this month, and many have gone to Alaska to find work until Oregon's rain finally arrives.

The timber industry is not the only area hit hard by the lack of rain. Local grass seed growers face problems as well.

"Farmers plant in the fall. The rain comes in and makes the plants grow so that when winter comes they're big enough to survive the winter," Herbert Christiansen of Hayworth Seed Warehouse said.

"As it stands now, those seeds aren't growing. When winter hits, it's going to rip the little plants we've got right out of there. I've seen farmers with entire fields that are dead right now," he said.

Rye grass seed is a major crop in Lane County, and Christiansen said the damage dealt to the industry is "irreversible" until next year.

A spokesman with the Eugene Water and Electric Board assured that Eugene area residents have plenty of water to meet their needs, regardless of the weather.

Water levels in nearby reservoirs, however, are getting the attention of local Army Corps of Engineers officials.

Cottage Grove Reservoir, about 20 miles south of Eugene, is presently only nine feet above its minimum surface elevation of 750 feet, a level normally attained in mid-November. Because the flow into the reservoir is low, the corps will be forced to reduce the reservoir's outflow into the Willamette River's coast fork, corps spokesman Kevin Reeves said.

Others affected by the dry spell are local sportsmen, including area hunters. Most of western Oregon land is closed due to fire dangers, and many are finding it difficult to stalk game in the dry, noisy brush.

Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife officials are monitoring the low levels in Oregon rivers and in fish hatcheries.

"It's not causing a terrific hardship right now," but the drought may decrease next summer's fish population unless the Northwest gets its rain, according to Jim Hutchison, a fish biologist for the Fish and Game department.

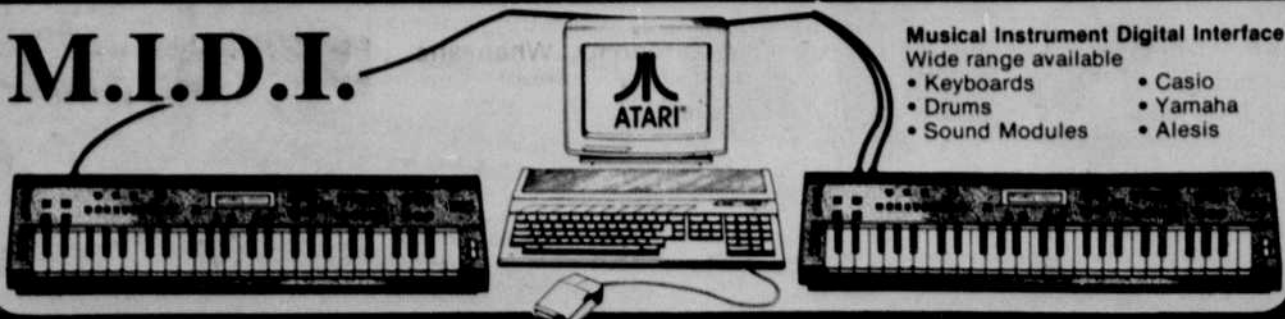
