But while she may lead the team in playing time, her passing and unselfish play causes her other statistics to be only a little better than average.

Camp's 51 kills is 200 less than team leader Teri Kramer's, and Camp is also tied for third on the team in services.

"It's sometimes hard (not getting the glory), but I don't want to be in the spotlight. I just want the team to do well. I'm not out there for me, I'm out

there for the team," Camp said.

While the three-year letter winner is overlooked in the statistical realm now, Camp's high school days were filled with glory, and she was one of the top major college prospects in the state. But, ironically, most of her recruiting didn't

come from volleyball.

Wake Forest, Army, and Stanford all offered Camp full-ride scholarships in basketball and a number of small colleges on the East Coast offered Camp track scholarships. But the three-sport, all-state athlete from Gresham's Barlow High School said Oregon was her first and only choice.

"I didn't want to go to West Point because I didn't want to be an officer," Camp said.

She also added that she didn't have very many options.

"I didn't take my five recruiting trips because right after volleyball season I went right into basketball and on the weekends I played club volleyball. It was kind of the same in the spring, because if I wasn't playing volleyball on the weekends I was running in invitational track meets," Camp said.

So why did she choose Oregon?

"I didn't visit Oregon either, but when I was little I went to the Dick Harter basketball camp and the state high school meet was always here. During the state meet I got a real good look at the campus," Camp said.

She added that she didn't want to leave home, and she wanted to prove that Oregon girls can compete in the Pac-10.

"I wanted my parents to be able to come to all the games because they always came when I was in high school," Camp said. "Teri (from Portland's Wilson High School) and I decided to go to Oregon to prove Oregon girls can compete."

That's exactly what the two Portland-area seniors and the rest of the squad will have to do this weekend if the Ducks have any kind of plans to continue playing beyond their season finale Nov. 21.

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
