"The petitions in support of keeping the president until 1992 are going to be circulated by students on campus...in the dorms, in the EMU and around campus buildings," Bradshaw said.

By week's end the petitions will be gathered and then sent to State Board President James Petersen, Bradshaw explained.

"Students' opinions have not been taken into account at all, on any level, and this is one of our only ways of getting our message to the State Board,"

Bradshaw added.

In a related development, chemistry professor Peter von Hippel has circulated a letter among faculty expressing his complaints with the executive committee's decision, as well as urging his colleagues to articulate their concerns to State Board members.

In addition, von Hippel attached a letter signed by a number of faculty members that was sent to James Petersen outlining several reasons why Olum's presidency should not be terminated in 1989.

Brown described two programs that will be of particular use to his students. Schema is a three-dimensional program that allows the students to pick a particular spot on their drawing and enlarge it for closer examination.

The other program, called energy scheming, is not available to the students yet, but has the capability to predict the energy that will be needed for

any model drafted on the computer.

The experimental studio will continue for the remainder of this school year, but Brown is not sure whether it will be available as a class next year.

"Some think it will continue next year. It's hard to say," he said.

At the end of this year, Brown and Novitski said they will publish a report about the experimental studio.

signatures in six to eight weeks, depending upon the amount of opposition the initiative receives.

Among the 11 rivers and 520 watery miles suggested as scenic waterways are stretches of the McKenzie, Deschutes, and Rogue rivers. If the initiative is passed by voters in 1988, then those areas will be kept free from development and logging.

"There are those who want to dam, and kill the fish...We want to keep these streams for the future," he said.

Both Kerr and Marlett indicated that they expect some resistance to the initiative to come from the city of Klamath Falls, where there is some placer mining for gold.

"On the whole, we think we have a good chance," Kerr said.

Friday's outing received little press coverage. Only one Portland broadcast station showed up to film the boaters, but Kerr said he was pleased with the turnout.

"It's an indication of your priorities," he told the group Friday.

Despite warnings of rain, ap-

proximately 60 people showed up for the symbolic two-mile river trip.

"This is the craziest thing I've ever heard of," grinned Dieter Mahlein, the Oregon representative of the Northwest River Council who helped to coordinate the Eugene portion of the river trip.

"We drive two hours to raft two miles...and then drive back," he said.

According to Mahlein, the idea for the Oregon Rivers Initiative originated a year ago and was discussed again last June at the Oregon River Rendezvous.

He said the organizations endorsing the initiative decided to give the decision directly to the voters by filing an initiative petition instead of working it through the legislative committees.

Kerr estimated that the proposed initiative represents approximately three percent of Oregon's rivers and would double the mileage of rivers already protected under the Oregon State Scenic Waterways System, which was established by voters on November 3, 1970.

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
