

Construction forces route change

Construction of the West Campus Gate on E. 13th Avenue at Kincaid Street may be an inconvenience not only for campus pedestrians, but also for Project Saferide drivers, who have had to change their routes for the duration of the construction.

Both routes — on-campus and off-campus — have rearranged the order of their stops, bypassing normally scheduled stops on the pedestrian section of 13th Avenue and instead going to the Law Library by way of Franklin Boulevard.

Project Saferide is a student-run rape prevention shuttle service for University women. Fare is free.

The vans should be back on the normal schedule by the first of the year, according to Alex Gordon, the University's construction inspection supervisor for the campus gate project. "Construction should be substantially completed by the end of December," Gordon said.

Saferide coordinators did not find out about the construction from the University Physical Plant, but from an article in last Friday's Oregon Daily Emerald. Assistant Director Meg Wilson said. The fences for the construction site went up early Monday morning. The route changes for Saferide went into effect Tuesday.

Wilson said she met with Gordon of the Physical Plant on Monday to see if it would be possible to remain on the

regular schedule by driving around the construction site fences. Because of limited space around the construction site, however, only emergency vehicles will be allowed through the area between the construction site and the Chiles Business Center.

Wilson said she's happy with ridership figures — about 65 riders last week — but she still is concerned about lack of volunteer drivers. Laurie Brendle, Saferide secretary, said there are simply not enough drivers to keep both vans running all of the time. They now have 27 drivers, but need about 45 to comfortably fill all of the driver time slots.

Despite the route changes, both routes still leave from the EMU Fishbowl at the regular times.
