

Nuclear war discussions subject of week-long forum

The University Arms Control Forum will sponsor a series of four public panel discussions to mark their sixth year of existence on campus beginning this Monday.

The week's discussions, entitled "Our Future/Our Choice," will provide education on the arms race.

The first day will focus on the social and economical cost of the arms race. The panel will begin its discussion at 8 p.m. in Cedar Room C of the EMU.

Panelists for Monday's forum will include Mike Weinstein, a physician with White Bird Medical Clinic; Ken Hartman, a retiree who has worked with the military industrial complex; and Cheyney Ryan, chairman of the philosophy department and peace studies professor.

Tuesday's panel will focus its discussion on "U.S.-Soviet

Treaties." It will meet at the EMU Cedar Room C at 8 p.m.

Members on the panel include Peter Swan, assistant to President Paul Olum for legal affairs and a law school faculty member; Jonathon Aleck, a local attorney working on legal research; Steve Johnson, a specialist on military strategy working with Decision Research; and Guenther Rose, a visiting political science professor from Humboldt University in Germany.

The controversial "Star Wars" issue will be addressed by Wednesday's panelists. They also will meet in EMU Cedar Room C at 8 p.m.

The panel will include Johnson; Rudy Hwa, a physics professor; David Bella, a professor with the Department of Engineering at Oregon State University; and John Conery, computer science instructor.

Thursday's topic will address "Who are the Russians." Members of this panel

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Book awards honor Oregon authors

Until recently many of Oregon's authors have remained unrecognized and unappreciated outside of literary circles.

The Oregon Institute of Literary Arts, however, is changing this with the recent establishment of the first Oregon book awards ever to recognize Oregon authors, said Ed Bingham, University history professor emeritus.

The institute, which is in its first year of existence, hopes to establish an annual tradition of awarding outstanding Oregon authors, said Bingham, who participated in the first Oregon Book Awards Ceremony and Celebration in October.

Two University professors and a University-sponsored magazine were the recipients of three of the five awards presented during the ceremony.

John Haislip, University English professor and director of the department's creative writing program, received the institute's award for poetry for his recently published collection of poems entitled "Seal Rock."

George Belknap, University editor emeritus, received the C.E.S. Wood award for his contributions to the state's history, most notably his book "Oregon

Imprints: 1845-1870." Northwest Review, a literary magazine received the Stewart H. Holbrook Award for significant contributions to Oregon literature. One thousand dollars and a silver metal accompanied each award.

Awards for outstanding non-fiction and fiction literary achievements also were presented to Barry Lopez of Finn Rock and Russell Working of Grants Pass.

"Eugene came out very well," said Bingham, who presented Belknap's award.

"It was a very important and significant event," said John Witte, editor of Northwest Review, who received the magazine's award. "It was statewide and (people from) Eugene walked away with almost all of the major awards," he said.

Northwest Review, partially funded by the University, acts as a "forum for experimental writing and writings of young authors who may not yet have achieved a reputation," Witte said.

"This award is one of the most significant awards the magazine has won — it's a well deserved honor," he added.

Haislip said he also is very honored. "It is the first book award in poetry from the institute. I appreciate recognition that the Oregon literary community has given me."

The nature of the award, which requires that it not be restricted to current events, pleases him, Belknap said, who has been part of the University community since 1922 when he entered as a freshman. "I was somewhat surprised at the \$1,000. I was very pleased with the award of course," Belknap said.

Belknap's contribution ("Oregon Imprints: 1845-1870") is in an area that is sort of esoteric. It is on the history of Oregon imprints and it is culturally, socially and politically important to the state, Bingham said.

"Seal Rock," a 10-year project for Haislip, is a "book simply unmatched by most of Haislip's contemporaries," according to George Vern's critique of Haislip's book found in the recent edition of Northwest Review.

"I have never been ambitious in terms of the politics poetry," said Haislip referring to writing poetry for political purposes. "I have taken my time and the book is finely crafted," Haislip said. He authored another collection of poems entitled "Not Every Year," published in 1971.

"Seal Rock" is about the town and people of Seal Rock, Haislip said. He is a part-time resident of that coastal town, located 15 miles south of Newport.
