University last year. Reiner, a CARP member at the University of Colorado at the time, agreed to relocate and help establish a branch here.

CARP currently has 20 members on its campus roster; 12 of them are full-timers who, according to Reiner, may have completed the 40-hour Unification principle study sessions. Full-time members "really emphasize CARP and almost make it their whole life's work," Reiner said, adding most won't join full time unless they hear, accept and like what the 40-hour sessions have to say.

Reiner's introduction to CARP happened more or less by accident, he said. In the late 1970s, his interest in music led him to San Francisco where he completed a two-year stint at a college for recording arts. Then in 1979 a friend of his ran into some CARP members on the street who invited the two for dinner. A Unification lecture accompanied the meal, after which Reiner became interested in the movement and soon discovered he "wanted to devote his life to it."

CARP, like the Unification Church, has not been immune to criticism. Detractors maintain CARP's goals as a student organization are enigmatic and in reality, it's a "front" group designed to recruit followers for the Unification Church.

According to CARP's national headquarters in New York, the organization sets out to "affirm the existence of God and God's love for humanity...to restore the equality of human value and genuine love for others...and to provide and promote a counter-proposal to Marxism-Leninism and the abuses of capitalism."

Adrian Greek, executive director of the Positive Action Committee, a Portland-based affiliate of the National Cult Awareness Network, holds no punches when it comes to criticizing the Unification Movement — CARP included.

PAC provides education and counseling to families and individuals who are affected by destructive cults. Greek defines a cult as any "organization that uses manipulation and deceptive practices which mentally, emotionally, and sometimes physically and sexually abuse the rights of people and their minds."

Greek puts the Unification Movement close to the top of the list of destructive cults, adding that Moonies operate under 300-400 different names, one of the largest being CARP.

"Generally speaking, CARP doesn't say up front exactly what its purpose and its affiliation is," Greek said. He added that what most people fail to realize is that the word "principle" in CARP's title refers to a

devine principle. "It's what Moon would, in effect, call bringing God into the 20th century," Greek said.

Reiner denied Greek's allegation CARP is a front group for the Unification Church and said there was a distinction between the Unification Church and the Unification Movement.

"We're a movement to bring unification in the world...The Unification Church doesn't work on college campuses, CARP does that," Reiner said.

"We're not a front organization for anything...We don't hide anything, and because of that we remain somewhat controversial, but that's fine. We're good people motivated to do

overload, Meyer said. "It strains their resources unless they are somehow able to get more, which doesn't happen real often."

"By us flushing out all these cases and sentencing people, we're just adding to their problem," Meyer said. "Any time you adjust one part of the criminal justice system, it ripples through everything else."

Although judges sentence individuals to months or years in jail or prison, it's very unlikely that the convict will serve out his sentence. There simply isn't room for them in the jails or prisons, Meyer said.

"People get arrested, put in jail for about six hours, then they're out," Meyer said. "Or the judge sentences somebody to five years and they're out after two months."

"It doesn't make the police or the corrections department very happy, and it certainly doesn't make the judges very happy," Meyer said. "It makes their sentences worthless. They sentence a guy to 20 years and it's a joke."
