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SEA organizes debate on crash

The Student Economics Association is sponsoring a panel discussion today on "Black Monday" — Oct. 19, 1987 — the day many of the world's financial markets crashed.

Anyone interested is encouraged to attend the "The Stock Market Crash: Another 1929?" said Greg Huber, SEA president. The discussion will be at 4 p.m. in the EMU Walnut Room.

The panel, which includes three University economics professors, will provide general information about the recent crash and its economic implications, Huber said.

"We want to know how devastating the crash really was, which is why we are relating it to the stockmarket crash of 1929," said SEA Publicity Chairman Marvin Hoffman, referring to the famous stock market crash that marked the beginning of the Great Depression of the 1930s.

Professors Henry Goldstein, Barry Siegel and Robert Smith, who will conduct the discussion, also will offer insights on how this sort of economic chaos can be prevented in the future, Huber said.

"Of course you will probably get three very different views," Hoffman added.

The SEA, which began last spring, is a student group that organizes educational lectures on economics and student/faculty socials with faculty members from the economics department, Huber said.

Many people don't really know what economics is about or what it involves, Huber said. "With our organization, we can give them some idea through lecture series and student/faculty socials so they can gain a better perspective on it, and so they can really see its usefulness."

"We want to stay involved with what is going on with the current events in the world," Hoffman said.

One of the group's main goals is to discuss economic activity with the Pacific Rim, Hoffman said. This is not to say, however, that if something comes up again, such as the recent stockmarket crash, the group wouldn't discuss it, Huber added.

The association, which currently has about 25 members, may discuss anything from U.S. trade with China to trade tariffs with Canada, Huber said.

"Our other main goal is to strengthen our ties with the (economics) faculty. We try to

have at least one student/faculty social a term. We have really received a strong reception from the faculty. They have been very enthusiastic about it," Hoffman said.

The socials will encourage students with the same economic interests to get to know one another and the faculty, Huber said. "Students can also get some insight with what they can do with their education once they get out of school," he added.

In addition, the group is working to bring someone from Gov. Neil Goldschmidt's administration to speak. It also is organizing tutoring services for students taking courses in economics 201 and 202. The tutorials will be offered sometime before finals, Hoffman said.

The SEA is open to any student who has an interest in economics, not necessarily just economics majors, Hoffman said. The group is very diversified, including students majoring in business, accounting, architecture and political science, he continued.

Any student interested in economics is encouraged to attend a SEA meeting. The association meets every Monday afternoon at 4:30 in 410 PLC.

popular with both the people of Oregon and the state legislature. "What we have to say loud and clear is the system belongs to the people of the state of Oregon," he said. The

board "does not have the people's interests at heart. It's up to Neil to make sure they do."

State Rep. Jim Edmunson, D-Eugene, told the crowd that Paul Olum signed his diploma, and that he wants "the students of 1992 to have that same luxury."

Chuck Hunt, president of the Graduate Teaching Fellows Federation, called for Goldschmidt to fire board Presi-

dent James Petersen.

"We ask that Mr. Petersen be removed," Hunt told the crowd. "The future of the University is at risk...The board has become the greatest danger to the University."

The rally ended when four students picked up a mock coffin symbolizing the death of "democracy in education" and led a procession around the hotel.
