their views have been carefully and thoughtfully considered by the board" in order to restore mutual respect between the University and the board, he said.

The choice of Olum's successor also must partially come from the University, he said. "If a new president is to be successful in leading this institution and in keeping it strong, that person must have the full support and confidence of the faculty," he said.

For the University to remain strong, Olum said two things are needed. There must be a strong commitment to Oregon's higher education by the governor and the Legislature in order to keep Oregon's best and brightest young people in state.

Secondly, Olum reiterated the need for a "close working relationship between the board and the University, each fulfilling its own proper role and each completely respectful of the role and function of the others."

Responding to calls for an elected, rather than appointed, state board, Olum stressed changing the system's structure would be "a terrible mistake

and we do not want it." An elected board does not make board members more responsible to the citizenry. Instead it reduces academic issues to political issues, thereby inhibiting the decision-making process, he said.

Having an appointed board "is an excellent structure, and it has played an important role in the greatness that American universities have achieved," he said. The current board does not have too much power. Instead, the concern is "the traditions in which that power is used."

Olum thanked the University for the "outpouring of affection and support (that) has been beyond anything I could have imagined... and it has certainly helped to sustain me."

"Do not be discouraged — do not give up hope. This University can still achieve all that we have together dreamt of for it," he said.

Afterwards, Olum turned the meeting over to Provost Richard Hill, and the assembly promptly voted no confidence in the board and the chancellor, 185-4 with seven abstentions.

The resolution takes excep-

tion to the lack of consultation with faculty and students, as well as the lack of recognition of the unified support for Olum and University community. Many believe the state board's action "will bring enduring injury to the University."

The resolution was forwarded to the assembly from the University Senate, which approved it in a slightly different form last week. Copies will be sent to Governor Goldschmidt, Chancellor William "Bud" Davis and members of the board.

A resolution proposed by law Professor James O'Fallon calling for the governor to appoint a commission to evaluate the governance system of the state system was tabled because of arguments defining the appointment of the commission.

The commission, according to the resolution, would recommend actions "to insure the traditional and essential role of faculties in institutional governance, including the selection of presidents, and the effective voice of students on matters affecting their education."

However, "the board decided it shouldn't be a cosmetic change" and rejected the proposal, Davis said.

Pierce said the name change remains an active issue in southern Oregon and should be discussed.

Proponents of the change have pointed out that industries seeking a location to set up business want to be near a university "whether it's a university or not," he said.

One of the questions the task force is going to have to ask is whether the name of a institution itself is beneficial in recruiting companies to a locality, Pierce added.

Jim Sellers, the state system's communications director, said he has received no feedback from WOSC or EOSC officials on the matter. "I know of no other support. It seems like it was a regional kind of thing," he said.

"One of the things the task force has to look at is, 'Does it help to be called a university? Do people put more stock into a school that is called a university?'"

Newbry said a name change isn't necessary. "If they're good, it doesn't make any difference what you call them," Newbry said, citing the reputa-

tions Reed and Lewis and Clark Colleges in Portland possess.

According to Pierce, task force members were chosen after the presidents of SOSC, WOSC and EOSC were contacted and asked to submit a list of names for consideration. The state board's executive committee then chose three people from each of the president's lists plus two at-large individuals.

The task force's next meeting is scheduled for Jan. 11 in Eugene. Public hearings have tentatively been scheduled to take place sometime in the spring of 1988.

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
