UN opposes policy

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The Security Council voted unanimously Tuesday to ask Israel not to deport Palestinians from the occupied territories. It marked the first time the United States voted against Israel in the council since 1981.

The United States is Israel's main defender at the United Nations and usually wields its veto power on behalf of the Jewish state.

But Israel's crackdown on riots in the occupied territories has provoked strong criticism in the United States. On Dec. 22, the United States rebuked Israel by abstaining from a Security Council vote condemning the crackdown. On Tuesday it joined the other 14 members of the council in calling on Israel not to deport nine Palestinian activists.

Since rioting broke in the West Bank and Gaza Strip Dec. 8, Israeli troops have fatally shot at least 24 Palestinians.

Kemp blasts Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican presidential aspirant Jack Kemp accused the Soviet Union on Tuesday of cheating on the treaty to ban intermediate-range nuclear missiles "even before the ink is dry."

In a letter to Secretary of State George P. Shultz, the New York congressman said the Soviets had sent a forged photograph of the SS-20 missile to be outlawed under the agreement.

He also accused the Soviets of providing inaccurate information about the size and location of their nuclear forces. A congressional source, who demanded anonymity, said the

Soviets "during the last month of negotiations gave us four different numbers for the SS-20s they had deployed."

Kemp said "these reported Soviet actions are a direct affront and challenge to the declared arms control policy of President Reagan."

Crash probe slated

PORTLAND (AP) — There was no sign of mechanical failure in a small plane crash last week that killed three members of a West Virginia family, a federal investigator said Tuesday.

However, Pete Mangum, an investigator for the National Transportation Safety Board in Seattle, said that the agency planned to disassemble the engine of the Cessna 182 or run it to see whether it had any problems that contributed to the Dec. 31 crash in northern Marion County.

The crash killed the pilot, Walter N. Breeden, 48, of Lewisburg, W. Va.; his wife, Ann, 47; and her son, Jeffrey Edman, 22, of Pleasanton, Calif.

The sole survivor was Timothy Frank Edman, 17, of Lewisburg. Breeden was his stepfather, and had earned his pilot's license only a few months before the crash.

Police nab suspect

PORTLAND (AP) — Police detectives arrested a man in Mississippi Tuesday in connection with the shooting death of a man who tried to come to the aid of a woman in north Portland.

George E. Davis, 24, offered no resistance when he was arrested at his residence in Greenwood, Miss., police spokesman Dave Simpson said. Davis was

being returned to Oregon for violating the terms of his release on charges that were unrelated to the shooting, Simpson said.

Joseph H. Holcomb, 27, was shot to death Dec. 12 when he tried to help a woman who was being harassed by two men outside her north Portland residence. Witnesses said Holcomb, who worked nearby, followed the men into a laundromat, where he was shot. Simpson said police have located but have not charged a second man who they believe was with Davis at the time of the shooting.

Trial date scheduled

GRANTS PASS (AP) — A Grants Pass midwife accused of trying to hire a man to kill her stepdaughter has been released on bail pending a trial scheduled for Feb. 23.

Lisa Pruitt-Barney posted \$10,000 cash to secure her \$100,000 bond on Monday, said Susan Hupp, operations supervisor for Josephine County District Court.

Pruitt-Barney was jailed Dec. 14 on charges of solicitation and conspiracy to commit aggravated murder. She has pleaded innocent to indictments on the charges and is scheduled to go on trial Feb. 23 in Josephine County Circuit Court.

Authorities alleged that Pruitt-Barney tried to hire a neighbor, Wesley Clair, to murder her stepdaughter, Teresa Leek, 17, of San Francisco, to collect \$50,000 in life insurance.



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
