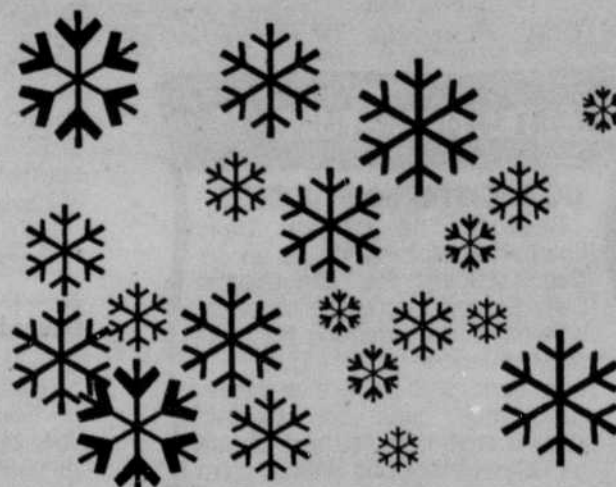
Practicum in Art Therapy

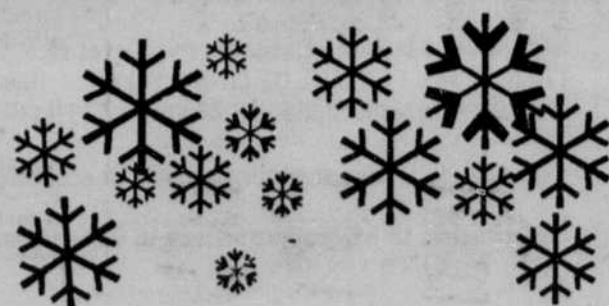
