Local barber shop pole returned

When Ed Mayers arrived at his barber shop Thursday morning, he found a pleasant surprise at the back door — his barber pole.

The barber pole at Kampus Barber Shop, 851 E. 13th Ave., was stolen about two weeks ago. But when Mayers arrived at 7:45 a.m., he found it returned in a box without a note.

"I take it back with no questions asked. I am curious as to why they wanted it, though," he said.

Maybe the pole was returned because of the press coverage, Mayers said. There were articles in the Register-Guard and Oregon Daily Emerald, as well as announcements on two radio stations and one local television station.

"Somebody told somebody that they better bring it back,"

said Rae-Marie Biagge, Kampus Barber Shop employee. "It's not worth much unless you're a barber."

This was the second pole Mayers has had stolen from his shop. The original, antique pole was taken 12 years ago and later found by police in a student's dorm room during a drug investigation. It now hangs inside the shop.

Mayers said he will hang the recovered pole outside sometime next week.

"Hopefully it'll be more secure," he said. "It boils down to the fact that if somebody wants something, they'll find a way to take it."

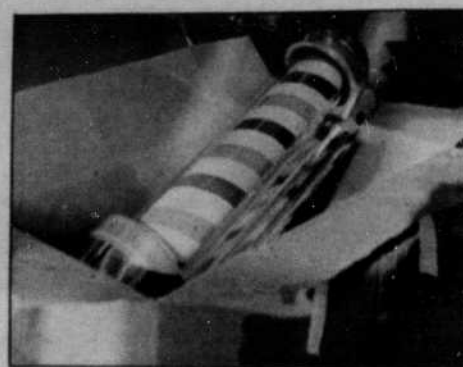

IFC allocates more than \$54,000

The Incidental Fee Committee allocated \$54,207 in student fees to three student groups and voted to change one of its resolutions in a meeting that

lasted three hours Thursday night.

The IFC additionally approved two special funding requests that amounted to \$3,450.

The student groups asking for funding included the Interfraternity and Panhellenic Councils, the Office of Student Advocacy and the Latin American Support Committee. The special requests were submitted by the Association of College Unions-International and the Gay and Lesbian Alliance.

GALA asked for and received a \$3,000 special request from the committee to help fund the group's Gay Pride Week, which is held every spring. Because GALA expressed fears it could not be repay the amount by the school year's end, half of the funding was given as a loan and the other half as a grant.

The committee also approved a special request submitted by Jane Jennings, the student chairwoman of the Association of College Unions-International. Jennings asked for \$450 in order to cover her costs to travel to New Orleans to attend the ACUI's annual conference as a student representative. The special request was passed unanimously.

The Latin American Support Committee was granted \$3,333 by the IFC. However, the committee debated over whether the \$200 educational film budget recommended by the group was necessary. The committee also questioned the request for advertising and postage costs.

Jack Maynard, not yet officially appointed to the IFC, suggested that the two educational films be eliminated, thereby reducing the amount of advertising costs as well. Committee member Steve Hoyt suggested a 10 percent reduction in the postage costs, lowering the cost from \$75 to \$68.

These two requests were passed unanimously by the committee.

Despite budget miscalculations and more dispute over the funding for postage costs, the Interfraternity and Panhellenic Councils, who were submitting their requests to be heard together by the IFC, were allotted \$8,521 by the committee.

The \$42,353 budget request for the Office of Student Advocacy, as submitted by the group's director, Lucy Kaplan, was also approved unanimously. The budget included a \$2,000 increase in the director's stipend.

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
