Yugoslav workers protest

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Thousands of workers from Yugoslavia's largest rubber and shoe plant forced their way into the Federal Parliament on Wednesday, demanding changes in the government and protesting low living standards.

In an action unprecedented in Communist Yugoslavia's postwar history, about 4,000 demonstrators clashed with security police in front of the Parliament building. Police were unable to keep them from entering.

The protesters filled the main lobby of the building for about half an hour before security men forced them to leave.

More than 10,000 workers at the plant, which employs at least 23,000 people, went on strike Saturday in what is believed to be one of the largest work stoppages in the country since it became communist.

Lawsuit targets Lockheed

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Workers at Lockheed Missiles & Space Co. used government computers to run a football pool, built a private airplane at public expense and billed the government for the time it took to write the entire Bible into a computer, according to a lawsuit unsealed Wednesday.

Lockheed officials would not comment until they had a chance to review the lawsuit, said company spokesman George Mulhern.

The lawsuit said one senior manager at the Sunnyvale defense contractor, using government charge numbers, had Lockheed machinists build him an airplane. He was allowed to retire when the project was

discovered, and he took the plane with him, the lawsuit alleged.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court in San Jose in January by a former Lockheed worker and a current employee under the False Claims Act, the San Jose Mercury News reported Wednesday as the lawsuit was unsealed.

Kaiser nurses strike

PORTLAND (AP) — Surgery and other medical services were halted Wednesday at one Kaiser Permanente Hospital and reduced at another as 1,000 registered nurses went on strike in a contract dispute centered on health care benefits.

Pickets began setting up lines shortly after the 7 a.m. strike deadline had passed at Bess Kaiser Medical Center in northeast Portland and at Kaiser Sunnyside Medical Center in the southeast part of the city.

The strike also affected 13 Kaiser clinics stretching from Salem to Longview, Wash.

No new talks were scheduled, officials said.

All emergency medical care, surgery and baby deliveries were halted at Kaiser Sunnyside and those services were curtailed at Bess Kaiser, said Kaiser spokeswoman Linda Pearson.

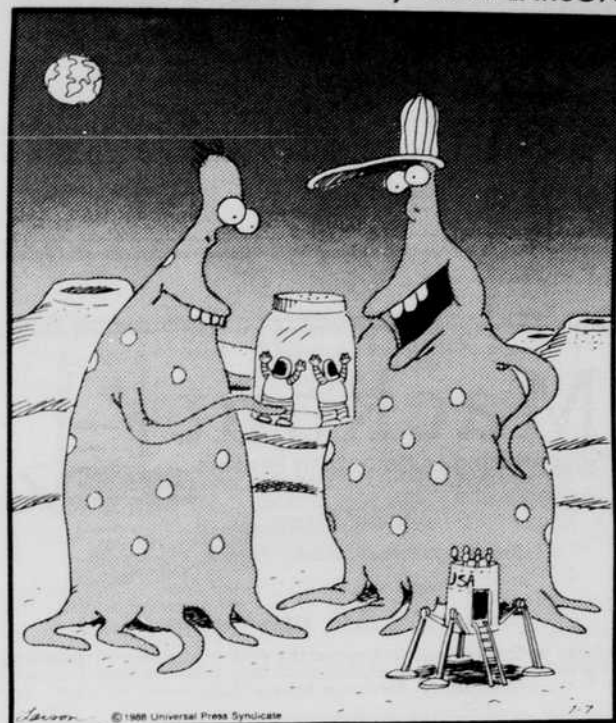
Some patients were transferred from Kaiser Sunnyside to Bess Kaiser while others were taken to other area hospitals that Pearson declined to identify.

Kaiser serves more than 330,000 people in Oregon and southwest Washington.

"We intend to stay out as long as it takes to obtain a fair and equitable contract," said Pat Boose, a spokeswoman for the Oregon Nurses Association.
