For at least one city leader, Option B is the best option the council could choose. Council President Freeman Holmer, who opposes the NFZ, said he believes it is inappropriate legislation for a city to make.

'Option B is something I have to come a long way from where I think we should be, which is to have no ordinance at all," he said "I don't believe I was elected to determine national foreign policy or national defense policy In a representative democracy, the national government is the one to decide these, not the individual localities, even by initiative and referendum."

However, Holmer said he was able to support Option B because the people have voted for a nuclear free zone twice. But his problems with the MRV stem from the powers of investigation and enforcment of the Nuclear Free Zone Board

Tim Birr, public information officer for the department, said the parks will be closed until it rains.


