

Project Saferide to receive funds

The Incidental Fee Committee allocated money to five student programs during its Wednesday night meeting.

Project Saferide will receive \$252 to finance a 10-week training position. The money will go to creating a training manual and hiring a student to train Saferide employees.

"It's in the best interests of the University to have a strong Saferide program," said IFC member Tim Hughes.

The committee also passed a joint proposal from Men Against Rape and University of Oregon/University of El Salvador Sister University Project (UO/UES) requesting funds to purchase a shared computer center pass.

Fifty dollars will be allocated to UO/UES from IFC surplus funds to purchase the joint computer pass.

UO/UES was also refunded \$30.03 for surplus money it held at the end of last year. The refund will be applied to telephone charges the program incurred during 1987-88.

The committee passed unanimously a subsidy request from ASUO President Karen Gaffney calling for a \$350 allocation to the Child Care and Development Center (CCDC). Gaffney said the funds will be used to create a student position to review child care eligibility forms.

In other business, the IFC reformed a resolution that will allow program representatives attending out-of-state conferences to use IFC funds to purchase food. The former resolution made it illegal for programs to use funds for that purpose unless specifically stated by the IFC.

In addition, the committee struck down a resolution that required all programs to publish documents in English. A previous IFC resolution stated that no programs could publish in a "foreign language".

Dodson said this opinion is prevalent in Salem because of the many area students who work in food processing plants during the later months of summer.

ASUO President Karen Gaffney stated in her testimony that she is very opposed to semester conversion. However, Gaffney said if there must be a semester conversion, the "Early Semester System is the lesser of two evils." She said the early calendar would be best academically because there is a clean break during winter vacation.

Gaffney also said that students entering careers would have a clear advantage in the job market by finishing school in the middle of May in an early calendar. "This is one advantage the early semester system has over the quarter system," Gaffney said.

EMU Child Care Coordinator Dennis Reynolds said the state board should consider the public school calendar in their semester schedule plan. He indicated that approximately 13 percent of the state-wide student body are parents.

Reynolds said the Early Semester and Traditional Semester calendars do not allow for the needs of student and faculty parents. For example, Reynolds said under the Traditional Semester Calendar, "student parents would have less option to use the (winter) break for needed studying."

John Bernham, Director of Counseling at Lane Community College, said the board needs to allow for student transfers between the state colleges and community colleges. He said if the system must be on semesters, the early semester pro-

grams would be best for transferring students because the fall term would end at the same time as Lane Community College.

Bernham said under the late semester system, "the community college student is seriously discriminated against in the transfer system."

An argument for the Traditional Semester System was brought up by physical education instructor Jim Blanchard. He noted that many faculty and students use the later part of summer for earning money in summer employment.

"A lot of us (the faculty and students) need that summer," Blanchard said.

Dodson said the board will make its final decision in its regular meeting on Dec. 9.

Campus Plan."

Speaking after the meeting, Olum said, "Their passing this form of the resolution was very reasonable, and I think before they take any position they would like to be very informed about the possibilities."

However, during the meeting Olum said, "We're going to have to involve other people to respond to answer (the Senate's) questions."

The Riverfront Design Advisory Committee is appointed by the president and advises on the preparation of the Riverfront master site plan and plan

changes.

Urquhart said at both the Senate meeting and at an earlier press conference he has always been in favor of a research park. However, he noted, "The University and the city have refused to consider other locations (for the park)."

Urquhart said the recreational fields at the University have been eroded, and he cited the establishment of parking structures on Howe Field.

No substitute areas for playing fields are available, he said. "If past experience is any guide, you don't tear down ur-

ban structures for playing fields."

Urquhart said the resolution can only put pressure on the president. "The terms of the discourse have been controlled by the University president and the city council," he said, adding that both sides have been talking only to supporters of the respective sides.

The research park is supported by the city council and both mayoral candidates. The opposition includes two local groups, Citizens for Responsible Land Use and Citizens for Fair Tax Distribution.

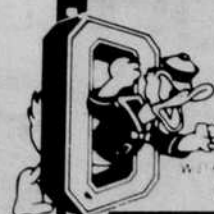
