The Student Senate on Thursday listened to Jill Freidberg and Brigitte Leach from the Students for the Ethical Treatment of Animals

(SETA) speak about the importance of animal rights.

"We want to create a compassionate climate for all animals," Leach said.

Freidberg added, "We promote equal consideration for all species and we need to get rid of the idea that humans are better than animals, because humans are animals."

In other business senators interviewed three students who applied for vacant senate seats.

Vicki Cahill was interviewed for seat 3, Mary Bacon for seat 11 and Clay Kinny for seat 7. The candidates were invited to next week's senate meeting where senators will either confirm or deny their applications.

Senators also discussed plans for a seminar that would focus on University issues specifically. The seminar would be open to University students, and senators are working on the possi-

bility that credits may be offered to those who attend the seminar.

Additionally, senators are looking into creating a standard class evaluation form.

"The form would consist of five to seven across-the-board questions applying to every class," said senate Chairman Eric Grimes.

what we can afford," Burrows said.

Peter Murphy, president of Murphy Company, expressed a very positive attitude toward

both Reagan and Bush. Murphy Company mainly deals with the timber industry.

"It's been an exciting and satisfying eight years and Bush has been one of the greatest vice presidents of all time," Murphy said.

Murphy said Bush would bring an effective style of management which, coupled with an excellent cabinet, would spur the economy into the '90s.

"I don't think we will be able to fill all of the help wanted signs," Murphy said.

"I'm excited. Bush is more qualified than any person to step into the Oval Office this century," Murphy said referring to Bush's experience as vice president.

Murphy said that Vice President Dan Quayle would contribute to the administration by providing insight and being a "good team player."

University professor James Klonoski strongly disagreed.

"Quayle is in such a political hole that he can't get out. He is no part of what's going on," he said.

Klonoski saw the attendance at the forum as an indicator of the apathy of the American people in regards to Bush.

"Out of 17,000 students we have about 15 come here. I suggest that this is indicative of how exciting Bush is for most Americans," Klonoski said.

Klonoski added it was impossible to predict the direction of a particular presidency. "Who would have guessed eight years ago that Reagan would have made peace with the Russians?" he said.

He asserted Congress and the Supreme Court, not the president, would be the major catalysts for change.

The shift to conservatism in the Supreme Court will be a major vehicle for change, especially with the abortion issue, Klonoski said.

The House Revenue and School Finance committee had its first serious meeting yesterday morning to listen to a speech by Bob Ridgley, the chairman of the Governor's Commission on School Funding Reform. Three House bills, 2136, 2137 and 2138, and a House joint resolution, HJR1, also were discussed at the meeting.

The commission formed at the end of the 1987 legislative session. In a report submitted Sept. 1, 1988, the commission recommended to Gov. Goldschmidt that he include \$318.2 million in his 1989-91 budget for school reform. In his budget proposal two months later, Goldschmidt appropriated \$246.2 million for education.

Most of the money was shaved from property tax reforms, as the governor halved

the commission's \$150 million recommendation. However, Goldschmidt increased the basic school support from \$105.7 million to \$129.3 million.

Republican House Minority Leader Larry Campbell served on the governor's committee.

"At the time, we thought that \$150 million would be needed for property tax relief. The governor didn't think so," he said.

Campbell went on to say the commission was only a starting point. "The commission gave the governor a proposal. Now it's up to the legislative committees to decide what to do with it."

"In the past, we've always dealt with basic school support after we paid for everything else in the budget. We shouldn't continue to do that."

Most of the fight over school

funding will take place in both the House and Senate Revenue and School Finance committees.

The spending cap has been a hotly contested issue. The governor drew the battle lines when he exceeded the spending limit in his budget proposal.

"We cannot solve the school funding problem without breaking the spending limit," District 22 Rep. Rick Kotulski said. "Whoever said that we could alleviate the problem (of school funding) without breaking the limit is either a fool or a liar."

Kotulski, a member of the Revenue and School Finance committee, wants to establish education as the number-one legislative priority. "We have to push as much money into basic school support as we can," he said.
