

Ducks will journey to Pac-10 Tourney

The Oregon men's basketball team will face the Washington State Cougars in the first round of the Pacific-10 Conference Tournament Thursday at 7:00 p.m., in Los Angeles.

The Ducks, losers of their last eight games and 1-12 over their last 13, are looking to break out of one of their longest slumps in recent memory that has seen them slide all the way into a ninth place finish in the Pac-

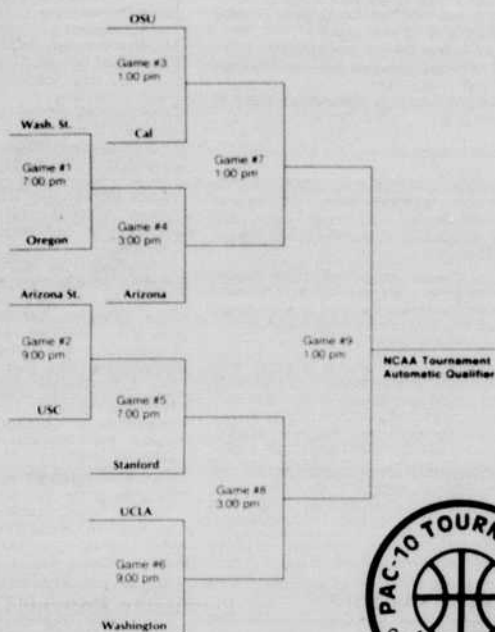
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The struggling Oregon team (8-20 overall, 3-15 in the Pac-10) will take on the Cougars for the right to face conference champion Arizona in the second round.

The Ducks bring a 2-2 record to the third annual conference tournament, while the Cougars will be looking for some of that post-season magic that saw them eliminate UCLA in last year's tourney.

Kasperski makes academic first team

Junior center Stefanie Kasperski of the Oregon women's basketball team was named to the GTE Academic All-America first team, voted on by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Kasperski, a two-time first team academic all-conference selection, compiled a 3.95 grade point average in biology in her third year at Oregon, recording a perfect 4.0 in each of her last six terms.

Nominees were required to accumulate a minimum grade point average of 3.20 on a 4.0 scale.

"It is quite an accomplishment to be chosen as one of the top five women in the country and one I'm pretty proud of," Kasperski said. "It has just been a matter of setting my priorities, and for me, that means concentrating only on basketball and my studies right now. It shows that I'm definitely headed in the right direction."

On the court, the 6-foot-7 Hamburg, West Germany native ranks second in the Pacific-10 Conference in scoring and rebounding, averaging 20.7 points and 10.0 rebounds a game.

"I think it is quite an honor for Stefanie as well as the Uni-

versity," Oregon head coach Elwin Heiny said. "It is always exceptional when an athlete can excel both academically as well as on the court, and I know she has put in a lot of hard work in both areas. I am certainly proud of her for an award she justly deserves."

Kasperski becomes the Ducks' first women's basketball player ever to be named a first team academic all-American. Former Oregon standout Bev Smith was selected to the second team in 1981. Kasperski also becomes the University's first athlete to receive the award since Mike Preacher received first team academic honors for football in 1986.

Chelle Flamoe of Oregon State, a three-time academic all-league selection, also was named to the first team. Flamoe, an academic all-American for the second straight year, owns a 3.91 grade point average in science.

Senner earns weekly award for weekend's wins

The Ducks picked up three wins in the talent-laden tournament, thanks in large part to the offensive production from Senner.

The freshman from Everett, Wash., had seven runs batted in, an .857 slugging percentage and eight hits, including two doubles, a triple and two home runs in 21 at bats over the two-day tournament.

Senner, a starter at second base for the Ducks, leads the team in hits, doubles, triples and home runs five weeks into the season.

She's currently hitting at a .403 clip with 15 runs scored and 17 RBI's.

The Elusive Quest for Racial Justice

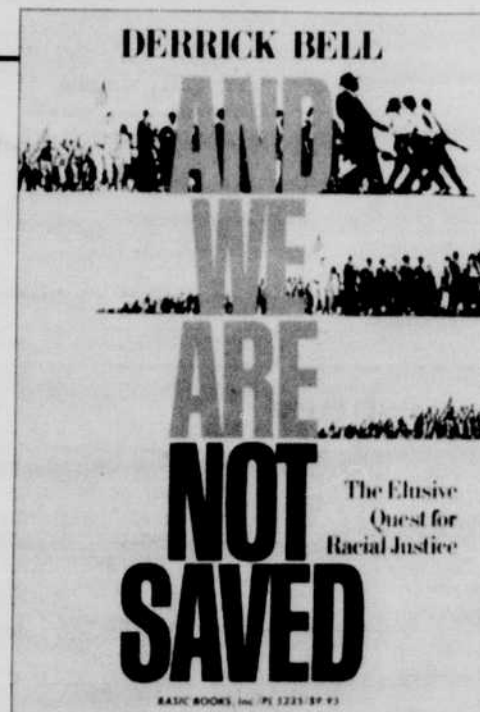
And We Are Not Saved DERRICK BELL

In his latest book, *And We Are Not Saved*, Professor Bell discusses the harsh realities of the Afro-American's attempt to bring about real changes in the fabric of American society—woven with racial prejudice and bigotry. He has chosen two fictional narrators, Geneva Crenshaw, a civil rights attorney, who is a gifted and courageous woman, and the other, Crenshaw's unnamed male friend and colleague who appears to be omniscient. For all who know him, this character is Professor Bell!

And We Are Not Saved will become a benchmark in the annals of post-civil rights discussions in the future. He has provided us with contemporary critical issues presented by characters who are compassionate, intellectual and radical in their approach to historical and social justice. His book is a reminder for compassionate people in this country to come together as Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. dreamed. We cannot and must not for a moment think that we are even close to the reality of that dream, because we are not saved!
